The Historian Tool Kit

While history is certainly transferred through our turn of the century and pre-depression era structures; it is also an ongoing process.

We each create history in our own space now.

As we approach the beginning of a three year bicentennial celebration, this proposal seeks to engage the public and create a culture of preservation around those buildings, artifacts and the personal history of the individuals and families who live here.

This proposal contemplates an ongoing collaboration among Boone County Historical Society, the Historic Columbia Cemetery, the Booneslick Road Committee, the State Historic Preservation Office, and the State Historical Society.

Year one, 2018: we propose a series of up to five workshops where we assist our citizens in discovering, accessing and using the resources available in our community (education year).

Year two, 2019: we propose to bring talent to the finished product of citizens to create displays and exhibits, with professional polish for the public to experience (gallery/exhibit year).

Year three, 2020: we propose to encourage and assist neighborhoods, subsets of neighborhoods and other geographic areas to celebrate the history they have discovered in a way that creates a legacy for them. What that legacy is will depend upon the interests and desires of the geographic area/subset.

Year one workshops, facilitated by local professionals in their fields (with an honorarium for their time) might include:

Land records and Sanborn maps

Legislative history of policies, local and state that affect historical outcomes

City directories and census records

Primary and secondary sources, photographs, abstracts, family pieces

Individual narratives

Cemetery symbolism and burial records

Migration patterns and infrastructure development (construction of Hwy 40, gov. land sales)
