

Flu Vaccination Update

As flu season ends, the Columbia/Boone County Health Department (CBCHD) reports more than 6,000 flu vaccinations given to citizens throughout late 2006 and early 2007. The CBCHD held three large public flu clinics at its location on Worley Street, in addition to many other out-reach efforts throughout the Columbia and Boone County area.

New this year was a "drive-thru" flu clinic. The event was a success with over 475 people taking advantage of the service. The purpose of the clinic was to practice alternative methods of dispensing vaccinations/medicine in the case of a public health emergency, such as pandemic influenza.

Council Action

The Council on Feb. 5:

- Authorized an on-system bridge replacement and rehabilitation program agreement with the Missouri Highways and Transportation Commission relating to replacement of a bridge over Hinkson Creek on Old Route K Outer Road, south of Reactor Park. The funding is authorized in the Federal-Aid-Highway Act. The preliminary estimate is \$1.8 million, which includes engineering, right-of-way, utility relocations and construction. Federal funding of \$900,000 was approved for replacement of the bridge. Costs of the sidewalk and the pedway on the bridge were not eligible for this grant. The grant requires a 20 percent match.

The Council on Feb. 19:

- Authorized the upgrade of water main along the north side of Walnut Street, between 10th Street and College Avenue. The project would upgrade approximately 1,300 feet of 4-inch cast iron water main to 8-inch PVC along the north side of Walnut connecting to existing 8-inch mains on 10th Street and College Avenue. This upgrade will improve domestic service to existing customers and bring fire protection infrastructure up to current standards. The estimated project cost is \$232,150.
- Authorized an agreement with Boone County for animal control services. The Boone County Commission contracts annually with the City of Columbia for animal control services. This renews the ongoing agreement. The contract for calendar year 2007 is \$146,351.

Columbia Water and Light and its partners, the State of Missouri, Allied Waste, and Ameresco, invite the public to share in our excitement as we break ground on a new renewable energy project. The project will convert landfill gas to electricity in Jefferson City, Mo. This innovative project will provide Columbia Water and Light with 2 percent of its renewable energy needs, and the waste heat from the generation facility will be used by two state prisons to meet their thermal needs. It is anticipated that construction of this 3.2 MW facility will be completed by the end of 2007.

Council Reserves Unique Land for Regional Park

When City Council members agreed to purchase land for a new regional park last March, they took a giant step to reserve a scarce resource for Columbia's future. Known as the "Crane property," this 320-acre tract lies at the city's southeast edge, near the intersection of Gans Road and Highway 63 South. It's a great location accessible to a new generation of park users who will live, work and attend school nearby.

Interest in a new regional park is based on the City's 2002 master plan, which identified a need to relieve the pressure on Cosmo Park. With its ball fields already scheduled beyond capacity, Cosmo Park can't handle full seasons for youth leagues now and won't satisfy future demands. Columbia also treasures its natural areas and understands the value of protecting them.

Acquiring this land through a voluntary sale is all about planning to serve Columbia families. The total price is \$8,075,000 (or \$25,000 per acre) for the land, plus \$75,000 to pay the cost of borrowing. The City will cover \$4.3 million of the total with fund balances in the Park Sales Tax and Parks Capital Fund accounts. Future revenue from the Park Sales Tax will repay the rest over four years.

Because voters had the foresight to authorize these resources in 2001, the City can purchase the Crane property without disrupting other park projects associated with a 2005 ballot issue and can operate and maintain existing facilities. These dedicated park funds, by law, are not available for other City services.

With a good plan, it's no accident when needs and opportunities come together. The Crane property is large enough to develop the ball fields and facilities needed for active sports over the next 15 – 20 years. It also protects a section of Gans Creek and shares a common boundary with Rock Bridge State Park. And it can connect with the adjacent Phillips Park, nearby Nifong Park and residential and commercial areas through trails and bikeways.

Volunteers keep our trails and parks safe



The Park Patrol, established in 1997 to keep our parks and trails safe and in good repair, is the city's largest volunteer program. In 2006, 80 volunteers logged more than 4,500 hours in city parks and trails serving as ambassadors to other users, reporting maintenance issues to park staff and assisting with special events and activities.

Volunteering with the Park Patrol is fun and easy, since it can be done while enjoying the outdoors. Volunteers can participate at their own pace and schedule and at the parks or trails they frequent.

Park Patrol is a joint program of the city's Office of Volunteer Services, Parks & Recreation Department, Police Department and U.S. Cellular, who has sponsored the program since its inception.

Park Patrol volunteers must be 18 years of age, agree to a background check, and must participate in a two-hour video training. To become a Park Patrol volunteer, contact the city's Office of Volunteer Services at 874-7499 or visit www.GoColumbiaMo.com.

More Water for Columbia

In 2003, Columbia voters approved a revenue bond issue to increase the capacity of the water system. The first step was to add a new well and upgrade the water treatment plant to deliver up to 32 million gallons of water a day. The new well is located near the existing wells and tap into an aquifer 100 feet below the ground. The expansion of the treatment plant included a new aerator, primary basin, secondary basin, two filters, pumps and a new lime processing system.

Expanding the water system from a capacity of 24 million gallons to 32 million gallons required an additional 36-inch water main. The new transmission line from the treatment plant to Columbia will be completed this spring. Also part of the bond issue were other water distribution improvements including a new pumping station on the north side of town, a water storage facility and water main upgrades. All of these water system projects will keep the water flowing to Columbia residents, when and where they need it, 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

Xeriscaping: water efficient landscaping

Up to 60 percent of all household water used during the summer months is outdoors on the landscape. A considerable amount of water can be saved through well-planned and well-managed landscapes. So, try xeriscaping and spend less time watering and more time enjoying your beautiful landscape!

- The key is to select plants according to the site conditions and stresses. Native Missouri plants are good choices since they tolerate wet spring soils and late summer drought.
- Clay soil types commonly found in Columbia don't absorb water well. Deeply cultivated, amended soil will improve drainage, save water and keep your plants healthy.
- Divide the landscape into three water use zones: low, moderate and high. Place plants with high water requirements in areas that receive the most water, like drainage ways, depressions or bottom of hills.
- Shade, whether from plants or structures, helps cool the landscape and reduces water loss. A shaded landscape can be as much as 20 percent cooler than full sun areas.
- Pay close attention to moisture in the soil to determine when to water. It also pays to do your homework on the water needs of the plants that you have selected for your yard.

- Mulch to retain moisture in the soil and prevent water-robbing weeds. Avoid using rocks around your plants since the heat they radiate will increase evaporation.



Bike Lanes Benefit Everyone

In the summer of 2007 the PedNet Project will stripe 10 miles of bike lanes, nearly doubling what already exists in Columbia. Bike lanes are beneficial for cyclists and drivers alike. They make cyclists feel welcome and safe on the road and provide space so they don't interfere with automobile traffic. Bike lanes are beneficial for neighborhoods because they add a traffic-calming effect on the streets and connect bike routes with larger streets to make commuting easier. Bicyclists can enter the car lane when turning left, or if the bike lane is filled with debris or if it's unsafe for other reasons. As the PedNet Project progresses, the City plans to stripe even more roads.

Let's all work together to insure that the federal grant invested in Columbia is worthwhile. Please be considerate of cyclists' needs as you drive around town, remembering they are part of traffic and have the same rights to the road as automobiles. The goal of the PedNet Project is to create a modal shift within our society to lower pollution and congestion and help people maintain a healthier, active lifestyle.
