# Martin Luther King, Jr. Memorial Restoration Campaign Continues

The City of Columbia New Century Fund, Inc. is continuing the drive to raise funds for the Martin Luther King, Jr. Memorial Restoration Project. The project committee, co-chaired by local citizens Eliot Battle and Susan Stalcup Gray, is well on its way to raising \$100,000 to repair the Memorial and create a maintenance endowment.

Since the Memorial was dedicated in 1993, it has suffered water damage resulting in calcium carbonate deposits that have stained the blue tile making up the steps of the amphitheater, a focal point of the site. The Memorial is located near Stadium Boulevard at the entrance to the MKT Trail.

# Columbia Channel Wins Awards

The Columbia Channel, the government access channel for the City of Columbia, was recently awarded two Telly awards and one local Addy award. The Telly awards began in 1980 as a way to recognize videos that were produced by non-network professionals. There were in excess of 10,000 entries in the competition from firms who produced videos for clients such as the Discovery Channel and MTV. The Addy awards were given by the Mid-Missouri Ad Federation.

One Telly award, in the cultural program category, was for the Artist in Residency video. This video documented New Haven elementary students creating a stained and etched glass window for their school with artist Susan Taylor-Glasgow. The series "Play as Learning" also won in the miscellaneous television program category. These shows taught parents play techniques to develop different skills in their children. The video series was funded through EduCare Boone County, in association with the Parks and Recreation Department. The silver Addy was awarded for a West Nile Virus public service announcement. The commercial is being forwarded to the district Ad Federation competition.


The Columbia Channel is broadcast on Mediacom channel 13 and Charter Communications channel 2.

#### **Council Action**

The Council on Feb. 17:

- Called for bids for the construction of improvements to Lake of the Woods Golf Course. The improvements will include the conversion of the fairways to zoysia grass turf. It is believed the entire fairway will convert to zoysia within three growing seasons. The estimated cost of the project is \$74,000. Paid for by Golf Course Improvement Fees. • Authorized an agreement with the
- Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services for smallpox immunization services. The Columbia/ Boone County Health Department is one of five local public health agencies statewide approved to provide the smallpox vaccination to approved public health agency staff and smallpox response teams in Missouri. Through the agreement, the city is reimbursed at a rate of \$30 per vaccination, in addition to a base contract amount of \$15,000. The total contract amount will not exceed \$31,440.
- The Council on March 3:
- Amended Chapter 2 of the City Code relating to the Substance Abuse Advisory Commission. The membership qualifications listed in the ordinance were changed from requiring one member be a student under the age of 19 to one member be a student under the age of 25.
- Authorized the sale of surplus land in the Indian Hills Subdivision. The lots will be conveyed by quit claim deed containing covenants requiring that single-family, owner-occupied structures be constructed on the property within two years.

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# National Homeland Security Advisory System

Following are the five alert levels of the National Homeland Security Advisory System and recommended actions. It is recommended that citizens become familiar with these threat

**RED - SEVERE** (Complete recommended actions at lower levels, plus)

- Listen to Radio or TV for current information and instructions
- Contact businesses and/or schools to determine status of work and/or school day
- Adhere to any travel restrictions announced by local government authorities
- Be prepared to shelter in place or evacuate if instructed to do so by local government
- Discuss children's fears concerning possible terrorist attacks

ORANGE - HIGH (Complete recommended actions at lower levels, plus)

- Exercise caution when traveling
- If a need is announced, donate blood at a designated blood collection agency
- Take additional precautions at public events

YELLOW - ELEVATED (Complete recommended actions at lower levels)

- Practice your Disaster Plan on the 11th of each month
- Develop alternate routes to and from work or school and practice them

BLUE - GUARDED (Complete recommended actions at lower levels)

- Be alert to suspicious activity and report it to the proper authorities
- Provide volunteer services and take advantage of additional volunteer training opportu-

#### **GREEN - LOW**

- Review and print a copy of Terrorism: Preparing For The Unexpected
- Develop a Personal/Family Disaster Plan and update as needed
- Prepare a Disaster Supplies Kit and update as needed
- Prepare a Shelter In Place Kit and update as needed
- Develop emergency communication plan with family members, neighbors and friends and update as needed
- Examine volunteer opportunities in your community; choose an agency to volunteer with and receive initial training
- If not known to you, contact school to determine their emergency notification and evacuation plans for children

#### **Prevent Theft from Motor** Vehicles

With spring time comes warm weather and the opportunity to knock off the winter cobwebs. We all love warmer weather and criminals like warmer weather, too. Most crime statistics show an increase in crime during the warmer months of the year. Perhaps the most persistent property crime problem in Columbia is theft from motor vehicles. Each month hundreds of cars are violated in Columbia. But, twenty-five percent of the cars broken into in 2002 weren't broken in to at all - they were left unlocked. Some of the most common items stolen are cellular phones, CD's, stereo equipment, checkbooks, purses and wallets. Each and every checkbook stolen from a vehicle results in numerous bad check cases. These bad check cases become a nightmare for the owner as well as the detectives who work these cases. However, theft from motor vehicles is one of the most preventable crimes in Columbia. Listed below are some simple steps to prevent you from becoming a victim.

- 1. Park in an area with good lighting. 2. Always lock your car!
- 3. Avoid leaving property in your car overnight.
- 4. If you must leave property in your car, place all valuables in the trunk or make an attempt to conceal the property if your vehicle does not have a trunk. Never leave blank checks, cash or credit cards in plain

During this time when major airports are experiencing 15-20 percent reductions in airline passengers, Columbia Regional Airport (COU) is holding its own. A total of 45,611 passengers enplaned and deplaned in 2002 - comparable to pre-September 11 numbers.

In February, American Connection filled just under one-half of the available seats in and out of Columbia. These low loads are surprising considering the cost of the round trip connection to St. Louis is about \$60 with no check-in, security screening, or baggage handling in St. Louis. Passengers can now print their boarding passes on-line from home or office, saving more time and receiving frequent flyer mileage bonuses.

## Open Burning

With warm weather already here in Mid-Missouri, a lot of spring cleaning is taking place. The Columbia Fire Department would like to remind everyone that open burning of any kind is prohibited in the city limits of Columbia.

A "Burn Permit" for small piles of brush, (no leaves, garden vegetation, trash or building material scraps) may be requested by calling the Columbia Fire Department at 874-7556. A Columbia Fire Marshal will visit the site and determine if a permit may be issued. Permits are valid only during daylight hours and the fire must be attended at all times. In addition, some type of fire protection, garden hose or fire extinguisher must be readily available.

Another alternative to disposing of lawn and garden materials is through the Public Works Department's weekly collection of solid waste or by taking some materials to local mulching and composting sites. Public Works can be contacted at 874-6291 for more information.

## Columbia Storm Water Management Program

The City of Columbia, Boone County and the University of Missouri Columbia campus have submitted a joint storm water program permit application to the Missouri Department of Natural Resources. This permit application is required by both MDNR and Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) under Phase II of the storm water permitting program. The narrative of the city's portion of the storm water permit application may be viewed at the city's web site at www.GoColumbiaMo.com.

EPA regulators have known for some time that storm water runoff from urbanized areas, especially rooftops, parking lots, roadways and highways, contains pollutants degrading the streams which receive this storm water runoff. EPA developed a 6-pronged approach for municipalities such as Columbia to address these storm water runoff issues. These measures, known as Minimum Control Measures, are:

Whenever the requested document is posted to the Web Site, the customer receives an e-mail message containing a link to the requested document.

In March, the Neighborhood Response Team (NRT) began conducting weekly property surveys in the central city area bounded by Providence, Ash, Ridgeway and the Business Loop. Representatives from the Health, Public Works, Police and Planning departments will be contacting individual property owners through the beginning of July to notify them of possible building and safety code violations, and will also be making available financial assistance programs where applicable.
