The Council on Jan. 18:

- Authorized construction of improvements to Nifong Park, Cosmo Park, Twin Lakes Recreation Area and American Legion Park. The city's fiscal year 2005 budget includes an appropriation of \$44,000 for an Annual Park Improvement Program. Funding comes from the 1999 1/4 cent sales tax.
- Called for a municipal election to elect council members for Ward 1 and Ward 5. The election will be held April 5.
- Authorized an agreement with the Missouri Safety Center to conduct enforcement activities for promoting seat belt usage. The Missouri Safety Center Youth Enforcement Grant, in funds up to \$4,608, provides reimbursement for officers' overtime pay to enforce seat belt and traffic violations around the high schools.



Awards Given at Diversity Celebration

Dr. Arvarh Strickland and Mid-Missouri Peaceworks were named recipients of the 2005 Columbia Values Diversity Awards. A special award was presented to Earl and the late Clara Miles.

Diversity awards are given annually to an individual and organization whose work in our community exemplifies the life and teachings of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.

Strickland became the first black professor at the University of Missouri in 1969. He chaired

the Department of History from 1980 - 1983; interim Director of the Black Studies Program in 1986; Associate Vice President for Academic Affairs from 1989–1991.

Kim Dill accepted the award for Mid-Missouri Peaceworks. A major thrust of Peaceworks is citizen empowerment and they have consistently offered education, forums, services and activities to enable people to speak and act their mind in matters of civic responsibility.

In the late 1950's, the Mileses and other black families, were determined to build or purchase homes in areas outside traditional black neighborhoods. Overcoming much resistance, the Mileses and the other families, wrote a new chapter in the civil rights history of Columbia when Miles Manor was developed in the mid-1960's.

Columbia Receives 'Financially Fit' Ranking

According to a report presented Jan. 18 to the U.S. Conference of Mayors Columbia is the ninth most financially fit U.S. metro area with a population less than 200,000. The study, conducted by the InCharge Education Foundation in Orlando, Fla., late last year, examined 314 metropolitan areas across three population categories.

The analysis utilized five factors to define and measure "financial fitness:"

- Real personal disposable income—total personal income minus personal current taxes.
- Employment opportunities—Since wages and salaries produce most of personal income, employment is an important indicator of financial success—not only at the family level, but also on a local and national level.
- Credit worthiness—How well is consumer income covering consumer expenditures and debts?
- Levels of savings—Savings is one of the most important indicators of financial wellness.
- Refinancing activity—Refinancing is connected to financial worth, and reflects the ability to convert non-financial assets—like one's home—into money that can be used to decrease debt or to spend or invest in things that will deliver higher returns.

Columbia Considers Next Generation Waste Management: Bioreactor Landfill

The Public Works Department is planning for the next cell at the City's sanitary landfill. The cell will be needed for operation in 2007. As part of the planning, the Public Works Department is evaluating the use of enhanced stabilization "bioreactor" technology to accelerate the biostabilization of the waste into a harmless inert substance and to produce methane gas at a higher rate for use as a renewable energy source.

The technique would be the first application in Missouri. Camp, Dresser & McKee, an international consulting firm, has been contracted to provide the engineering services associated with the design and construction of the landfill cell. The first phase is to provide an economic and viability analysis on using the bioreactor process.

The primary differences in the bioreactor technique and the current practice are shown below.
