Vacation Crime Prevention Tips

Many families vacation during the summer. Reduce the possibility that your house will be burglarized or vandalized while you are gone. A vacant house, or one that appears unoccupied, is an appealing target for burglars.

- Inform your neighbors when you leave and when you plan to return, so they can be on alert for suspicious persons. Leave a key with a trusted neighbor, so your house may be periodically inspected. Ask them to vary the position of your shades and blinds. If possible, arrange for a friend or relative to house-sit.
- Have a neighbor pick up your mail daily. Do not discontinue newspaper deliveries. Have a neighbor collect them, as well as any advertising circulars.
- Ask a neighbor to park in your driveway, occasionally place garbage in your garbage can and dispose of any debris that accumulates on your property. If possible, have a neighbor mow your lawn or shovel your sidewalk when needed.
- Set the bell on your telephone to low so that it can't be heard from the street. If you have call-forwarding, forward your phone to a residence of a friend or family member (with their permission, of course!).
- Use automatic timers to turn lights on at dusk and off at your bedtime. Vary the lights and have a radio or TV on a timer. NEVER leave lights or the radio on constantly. Tune your radio to a talk show so that human voices are heard.
- DON'T publicize your vacation plans.
- Keep your garage door closed and locked so no one can see if your car is gone.
- If you have a phone answering machine, do not leave specific information about your




Youth Recreation Scholarships

Up to 60 percent of household water used during summer months is outdoors on the landscape. A considerable amount of water can be saved through well-planned and well-managed landscapes. Try xeriscaping and spend less time watering and more time enjoying your beautiful landscape!

- Select plants according to site conditions and stresses. Native Missouri plants are good choices since they tolerate wet spring soils and late summer drought.
- Clay soil types commonly found in Columbia don't absorb water well. Deeply cultivated, amended soil will improve drainage, save water and keep your plants healthy.
- Divide the landscape into three water-use zones: low, moderate and high. Place plants with high water requirements in areas that receive the most water, like drainage ways, depressions or bottom of hills.
- Shade, whether from plants or structures, helps cool the landscape and reduces water loss. A shaded landscape can be as much as 20 percent cooler than full sun areas.
- Pay close attention to moisture in the soil to determine when to water. It also pays to do your home work on the water needs of the plants that you have selected for your yard.
- Mulch to retain moisture in the soil and prevent water-robbing weeds. Avoid using rocks around your plants since the heat they radiate will increase evaporation.

Columbia earns electric reliability honor

Columbia Water and Light was recognized by the American Public Power Association (APPA) with the Reliable Public Power Provider (RP3) designation for providing consumers with the highest degree of reliable and safe electric service.

The RP3 recognizes public power utilities that demonstrate proficiency in four key disciplines: reliability, safety, training and system improvement. Criteria within each category are based on sound business practices and represent a utility-wide commitment to safe and reliable delivery of electricity.

"You have joined the ranks of a select group of outstanding utilities Through this program we continue to highlight your commitment to providing reliable public power," stated Michael Hyland, APPA vice president of engineering services.

APPA is the national organization representing more than 2,000 not-for-profit, community and state-owned electric utilities. Columbia Water & Light was last named as and RP3 utility in 2007. Utilities are eligible to receive this honor every two years.

Environmental Health busy at work this spring

The arrival of spring brings increased activity for the Columbia/ Boone County Department of Public Health and Human Services Environmental Health Division. When people get outside and become more active, they also become more observant. As residents venture outside after being cooped up all winter, they are often reminded of issues they may have overlooked during winter months: the accumulation of debris in a neighbor's yard, an overflowing sewer or standing water that could breed mosqui-

These nuisances should be reported to Environmental Health, which works with the property owner to resolve the issue. If you wish to report a potential problem and/or nuisance, call the Environmental Health hotline at 874-7339 or e-mail grw@ GoColumbiaMo.com.

Pool inspections also begin this time of year. Environmental Health inspects approximately 105 swimming pools and/or spas for structural integrity, disinfectant levels, pH level, warning signs and presence of safety equipment. The facilities are also checked for cleanliness and maintenance of the grounds, locker rooms and fencing. The passage of the Graeme Baker Act will require changes in the way some pool drains are plumbed. These changes will help ensure the safety of pool patrons.
