# New purpose to old buildings

The Daniel Boone Building has stood at 701 East Broadway since 1917. Originally a hotel and tavern, this venerable building is undergoing a threephase project to expand and renovate City Hall. The soon-to-be completed Phase 1 features lobby renovations and new offices for Utility Customer Services, including a canopied, drive-thru area for utility customers, and temporary offices for the Finance Department.

Phase 2 involves demolishing the current utility services "annex" at 8th and Broadway followed by construction of a five-story addition on the east side of the Daniel Boone building. Scheduled for completion by late 2009, plans include City Hall Plaza, which will feature public space and a "Percent for Art" project.

Phase 3 will include complete interior renovation of the Daniel Boone building, plus energy-efficient windows, a new reflective roof and an exterior facade compatible with the new addition. Work will take about one year.

A series of bond issues will allow funding of the project without raising taxes. When completed, City offices currently housed in rental spaces throughout downtown will move back into the City Hall complex, achieving a goal to centralize City services in an easily accessible cluster of recycled, historic buildings that also includes the recently renovated Howard and Gentry buildings.

A Phase 1 open house will occur in November or December. Details of the open house and addition renovation updates will soon be posted at www.GoColumbiaMo.com.



#### Youth recreation scholarships

Columbia Parks and Recreation offers youth financial assistance scholarships for Columbia residents through the Youth Enrichment Services (YES) program. The program is open to those between 3 and 17 who meet the income/household criteria established by the USDA's free and reduced lunch program.

Financial assistance is available for 50 percent or 75 percent depending on the household. Scholarships can be used for recreational classes & programs, outdoor pool passes and ARC memberships.

# Winter weather safety and awareness

 $BEFORE \stackrel{\mathrm{WINTER}}{\mathrm{STORM}}$  Have a disaster plan and prepare a supplies kit for your home and car. Include a first-aid kit, canned foods and can opener, bottled water, battery-operated radio, flashlight, protective clothing and blankets. In case of a power outage, have an emergency heat source: fireplace, wood stove or space heater.

DURING WINTER STORM Stay indoors and dress warmly. Eat regularly to provide the body with energy for producing its own heat. Also, drink lots of water. If you must go outside, wear layered clothing, mittens and a hat. Watch for signs of hypothermia and frostbite. Always change wet clothing to prevent the loss of body heat. If you must drive, carry a cell phone, keep the gas tank full and let someone know where you're going. If your car gets stuck, don't wander off; it's best to wait for help.

AFTER STORM Avoid driving until conditions have improved. Avoid overexertion! Heart attacks from shoveling snow are the leading cause of deaths during the winter. Check on neighbors, especially the elderly. An excellent resource on this topic is the National Weather Service (NWS) Web site: www.nws.noaa.gov/om/winter/index.shtml.
