


March 6 open house for City Hall

Completion of City Hall Renovation and Expansion Phase I will culminate with an open house on Thursday, March 6, 2008, from 5 – 7 p.m. in the Daniel Boone Building at 701. E. Broadway. This phase of the project includes a new location for Utility Customer Services and Treasury Management who were previously located in the "anex" on the northwest corner of 8th & Broadway.

Phase II - construction of a five-story addition east of the Daniel Boone Building, is scheduled to begin this summer, followed by Phase III, full renovation of the Daniel Boone Building.

The entire City Hall project, which will be completed by December 2010 without raising taxes, will allow the City to consolidate operations for citizens, improve communications and service efficiency and eliminat the need for leased office space. 

Neighborhood Response Team completes busy 2007

The City of Columbia's Neighborhood Response Team (NRT) completed another round of property inspections in 2007. Increased emphasis on addressing chronic property nuisances resulted in a record number of improved properties for the 8-year-old program, with 12 dilapidated structures demolished and an additional 22 structures significantly improved. The complete annual report is available on the City's Web site at www.GoColumbiaMo.com.

Comprised of the Health, Legal, Planning, Police, Public Communications and Public Works departments, the NRT seeks to improve the living conditions of City residents by addressing property nuisance issues. The field team conducts annual inspections in a priority area comprised mainly of Columbia's central City, but action is taken City-wide as circumstances require. The NRT takes note of violations observed from the public right-of-way, such as roof deterioration, peeling paint, debris in yard, etc. The owner of a property found with conditions that do not meet City property maintenance codes is asked to take corrective action. Legal action is taken only in the event that a property is not improved. There are several programs in place to assist eligible homeowners in financial need to bring their properties back into code, including housing rehabilitation and code deficiency abatement.

The City of Columbia recognizes Jeff Zimmerschied as March's volunteer of the month for his service to the Columbia Public Works Department.

Zimmerschied, owner of the organic lawn care service The Lawn Company, has been in the business since 1999. He has also been a member of the Mid-American Green Industries Council.

The City of Columbia launched the environmentally-friendly focused lawn care program 'Show-Me Yards and Neighborhoods' in 2005 with Zimmerschied serving as part of the founding committee. The program's goal was to reduce storm water pollution from entering Columbia streams. Thanks to Zimmerschied's help, the program was an enormous success.

"Over 700 citizens have taken the three-session classes or attended 'Show Me Yards' field days, which showcased beautiful local yards, gardens and rain gardens to give residents tips and ideas for how to transform their yards into the healthiest yard possible for themselves, their children and pets while still preserving water quality in our area streams and rivers," said volunteer supervisor Mona Menezes.

Aside from helping create the program, Zimmerschied also serves as a volunteer speaker at all Show-Me Yards workshops. He has graciously donated not only his time, but his services and extensive lawn care knowledge as well.

"Jeff is one of those people who shows up early and stays late when there is work to be done at Show-Me Yards events," Menezes said. "Because of his service, hundreds of citizens have had opportunities to tour healthy green lawns and gardens and learn more about the lawn and stream connection."

Parks and Recreation offices move from Parkade Center

As of Feb. 1, Parks and Recreation offices formerly located at the Parkade Center are located adjacent to Stephens Lake Park. The office moved into the building at 2311 E. Walnut and is now called the Stephens Lake Activity Center. The new center houses life enrichment classes, preschool programs, special events and 50+ programming, including the Older American Klub and OAK Tours. All of these programs were previously in Suite 216B at Parkade. The City Council approved the lease for the new location on Dec. 17, 2007. The building offers more space for Parks and Recreation programs, with about

9,800 square feet.

With its proximity to Stephens Lake Park, the facility will also offer a recreation alternative to participants. Staff will be able to include the park and its walking trails in activities.

Programs that will be offered at the Stephens Lake Activity Center include Tae Kwon Do, music, arts and crafts, self-improvement classes, preschool theme parties and senior citizen programs such as bingo, pool, music, dances and social activities.

Chapel Hill project near completion

The Chapel Hill construction project is nearing completion with the expansion of Chapel Hill Road from Scott Boulevard to Gillespie Bridge Road. The project, identified in the 2005 Capital Improvement Plan, includes approximately 4,700 feet of new roadway with a 5-foot sidewalk on the south side and an 8-foot pedway on the north side. Additional improvements include a bridge with a pedestrian underpass, street lighting and a new traffic signal at Scott Boulevard and Chapel Hill.

Total cost for this project is approximately \$3.3 million. The project is being funded by capital improvement sales tax funds, county road tax rebate funds, Boone County grant funds and development charges. The new section of Chapel Hill is expected to open this spring.
