



Pools open for the summer

Daily admission fees at Columbia's pools: \$1 for patrons 2 years and older at Douglass, \$1.50 for ages 2-15 and \$2.75 for ages 16 and up at Lake of the Woods and Little Mates Cove, and \$2.50 for ages 2-15 and \$3.75 for ages 16 and up at Albert-Oakland.

Appropriate swim attire is required to enter all aquatic facilities (swim trunks or swimsuits). Examples of inappropriate attire include basketball shorts, cut-offs, sports bras, sweatpants and cargo shorts.


Officer Gamal Castile (left) and Officer Justin Anthony (right) make up the Central Neighborhood Community Outreach team.



Budget breakdown – General Fund financial uses

From our general fund budget, where is the majority of the money allocated? Out of \$84,825,464 in the general fund, 48.88 percent is allocated to public safety departments (Police, Fire, Public Safety Joint Communications and Municipal Court), 16.14 percent is for administrative departments (City Council, City Clerk, City Manager, Finance, Human Resources, Law, City General and Public Works administration), 14.85 percent goes towards departments in the areas of health and environment (Health and Human Services, Community Development, Economic Development, Cultural Affairs, Convention and Visitors Bureau, Office of Sustainability, Community Development Block Grant Fund, and the Contributions Fund), 13.11 percent is allocated for transportation departments (Public Works engineering, streets and sidewalks, and parking enforcement) and 7.02 percent goes towards parks and recreation. Money for the general fund comes from gross receipt tax, property tax and 1 percent of sales tax. Some of these departments are also funded by dedicated taxes, fees and/or grants.



Protect your home against MOSQUITOES

Mosquitoes can develop in any standing water that is present for more than five days. To reduce the mosquito population around your home and property, eliminate all standing water and debris. Here are some spots where water can collect or where poor maintenance can cause problems.




Pool cover that collects water, neglected swimming pool, hot tub or child's wading pool



Birdbath (clean weekly) and ornamental pond (stock with fish)



Any toy, garden equipment or container that can hold water



Flat roof without adequate drainage



Clogged rain gutter (home and street)


Dump Standing Water



Junk and discarded tires (drill drain holes in bottom of tire swings)



Tree rot hole or hollow stump



Missing, damaged or improperly installed screens



Uncovered boat or boat cover that collects water



Leaky faucet or pet bowl (change water daily)

Children 18 years old and younger will be provided with nutritional summertime lunches beginning June 6 through August 5 at Douglass Park, 400 North Providence Road. Refrigerator reminder!

With summer quickly approaching, don't forget to check the seals on your refrigerator door to make sure they are clean and tight. Test them by closing the door over a piece of paper or a dollar bill so it is half in and half out of the refrigerator. If you can pull the paper or bill out easily, the latch may need adjustment, the seal may need replacing, or you may consider buying a new unit. Your refrigerator accounts for up to 11 percent of your household's total energy use, and losing cool air through leaks can have a major impact on your energy bill.



New maps on Community Dashboard

Columbia's landscapes and built environment are ever-changing. The Community Dashboard is a map-based tool that is updated nightly to share current information about planning cases, infrastructure projects, development and construction, and special events. Several tabs feature a time slider, allowing exploration of building and demolition permits from the last 10 years and identified capital projects to 2025. New to the Community Dashboard is a tab showing active code enforcement cases.

Utility Customer Service (UCS) continues to work on configuring and implementing the new billing software. Our tentative go live date for the new software is during May but this could change. When a firm date for the conversion has been determined, there might be times when the Utility Customer Service lobbies will be closed temporarily, and UCS will make every effort to let customers know when those closures will occur. There might also be changes in the meter reading cycle which could impact when your bills are due. Letters will be mailed to each customer around the time of the software conversion to explain all the detailed information that will be included in the new bills. Thank you in advance for your patience as we work through this billing software change.

Code corner – weeds

Spring is here which means the grass will be growing and hopefully everyone is keeping their lawns mowed. In the case someone is not keeping up with their lawn, the City enforces the weed ordinance. The weed ordinance addresses vegetation that has attained a height of 12 inches. Property owners may receive an abatement notice if they are in violation. When properties are out of compliance, the City may abate the weeds and tax bill the property for mowing.
