

Severe Weathe **Awareness Week** set for March 8 -12

The Columbia/Boone County Office of Emergency Management (OEM), in conjunction with the State Emergency Management Agency and National Weather Service, will take part in the annual observance of "Severe Weather Awareness Week" March 8-12. The week is designed to heighten awareness about the threat that thunderstorms and severe weather can bring, and encourage businesses, schools and families to update their plans in the event of a tornado. Knowing what to do or where to go when severe weather threatens can be the difference between life and death.

In addition to preparing a plan for your family, students and business, the OEM recommends the purchase of an NOAA weather radio. Weather radios can be easily programmed for your specific area and can notify you of impending severe weather well in advance of the storms. Outdoor warning sirens are important, but they are not designed to be heard by people indoors.

As part of "Severe Weather Awareness Week", a statewide tornado drill is planned for 1:30 p.m. Tuesday, March 9. At that time, the OEM will activate storm warning sirens across the county. Schools, businesses, daycare centers, churches and government facilities are encouraged to conduct drills and examine their emergency plans. The OEM has a number of free publications available upon request to help prepare for a disaster. 

The awards are given to an individual/family and an organization/group that have made significant contributions in promoting appreciation for diversity and cultural understanding in Columbia.

The organizational award went to **Centro Latino**, an organization that strives to increase cultural appreciation and foster a respectful environment throughout Columbia. The Centro Latino empowers families to navigate health, education and cultural resources, helping bridge linguistic and cultural differences for the betterment of the people served and for the good of the community as a whole.

Bill and Dolores Clark, whose contribution to promoting racial harmony in Columbia predates Dr. King's leadership of the civil rights movement, were presented the family award. In addition, Bill's columns in the Columbia Daily Tribune have introduced generations of readers to Columbians who have made significant contributions to the dynamics of our community, but in some cases have long been forgotten.
