





Coming soon! Waterfalls at Stephens Lake Park

Columbia Parks and Recreation is nearing completion of the construction of two waterfalls located just north of the lake at Stephens Lake Park. Both waterfalls pump water from the deep part of the lake to the top of the hill where it cascades down through the pools and boulders. The process oxygenates the water and filters it through native plants, improving the water quality of the lake while providing a beautiful feature for park users.

The waterfalls are part of the arboretum feature of the park master plan, which went through extensive public input and was approved by City Council in 2002. The

Parks and Recreation Department secured two donations to finance

the waterfalls -- \$50,000 from the Mary Nall Trust in memory of Russ and Mary Grant Nall for the large waterfall and \$10,000 from Ed Petersheim for the small waterfall. Plaques acknowledging the donors will be placed in the park.

The waterfalls are scheduled for completion this spring.

To qualify, you must have lived at your current residence longer than 12 months for your monthly payment to be calculated. Every March, your account will be reviewed to see if you have overpaid or underpaid and adjustments will be made accordingly.

To sign up for budget billing, use the tear-off flap of your return envelope or call 874-7380. Please note that enrollment for budget billing is only held in March.

Youth Recreation Scholarships

Columbia Parks and Recreation offers youth financial assistance scholarships for Columbia residents through the Youth Enrichment Services (YES) program. The program is open to those between 3 and 17 who meet the income/household criteria established by the USDA's free and reduced lunch program.

Financial assistance is available for 50 or 75 percent depending on the household. Scholarships can be used for recreational classes and programs, outdoor pool passes and ARC memberships.
