The wind farm being constructed in Northwest Missouri will consist of 27 two-megawatt units. Columbia has agreed to purchase the output from three of the units in 2007.

Restoring your power

What do tree limbs, lightning, ice, and squirrels all have in common? All of them can cause a power outage. When there are problems with the electric system, Columbia Water and Light makes every effort to restore your power as soon as possible.

Usually in cases where Mother Nature causes problems with the electric system, there can be multiple outages across town. When this happens, Columbia Water and Light will repair main distribution lines before feeder lines to individual customers. By prioritizing restoration efforts, the utility can restore power to a greater number of people first. Some customers, like hospitals, are also at the top of the restoration priority list due to the critical nature of their business.

Another factor in restoring power is the extent of the damage. Sometimes repairs are as easy as replacing a fuse, other times a whole line needs to be replaced. Since no two outages are the same, it is often hard to estimate how long an outage will last.

Columbia Water and Light encourages you to call 874-2555 during an outage so we can quickly locate where the problem is occurring and send crews out right away. Any detailed information you can supply to the utility about the outage is very beneficial in the trouble-shooting process.

Power & water outages 875-2555

During large outages, your call might be handled by an automatic phone system. If you reach the automatic system, you will be instructed to enter the 10 digit phone number associated with your utility account. If your customer information on file is correct, the automatic system will either let you know the problem has been reported or will log your power outage report and dispatch a crew. This automatic phone system is most efficient if the correct phone number is on file with your account. To update your utility account and streamline your power outage reports, please call Utility Customer Service at 874-7380 or e-mail your current information to UCS @ GoColumbiaMo.com.

Council Action

The Council on Oct. 2:

- Authorized an agreement with the Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services for the regional public health emergency planning and preparedness program. The \$197,344 provides funding for regional emergency preparedness activities related specifically to public health needs. The contract period is Sept. 1, 2006, through Aug. 31, 2007.
- Authorized an airline airport agreement with Air Midwest, Inc., for commercial air service at Columbia Regional Airport. The agreement covers the two-year contract period the Department of Transportation has established through the Essential Air Service Program.

The Council on Oct. 16:

- Authorized a cooperative agreement with the Missouri Department of Conservation for a Tree Resource Improvement and Maintenance (TRIM) grant in the amount of \$7,547 for advanced arborist training for Parks and Recreation employees. The goal of this grant is to provide advanced arborist training for both the Parks and Recreation Department forestry staff and local members of the Central Missouri Community Forestry Council.
- Accepted a grant from the Missouri Department of Transportation Highway Safety Division for DWI enforcement. The grant, in the amount of \$12,025, will fund overtime for "off duty" officers to conduct special traffic enforcement identifying and apprehending DWI violators. The grant period is Oct. 1, 2006, through Sept. 30, 2007.





Before a winter storm: Have a disaster plan and prepare a supplies kit for your home and car. Include a first-aid kit, canned foods and can opener, bottled water, battery-operated radio, flashlight, protective clothing, and blankets. In case of power outage, have an emergency heat source: fireplace, wood stove, space heater.

During a winter storm: Stay indoors and dress warmly. Eat regularly – to provide the body with energy for producing its own heat. Also, drink lots of water. If you must go outside, wear layered clothing, mittens and a hat. Watch for signs of hypothermia and frostbite. Always change wet clothing to prevent the loss of body heat. If you must drive, carry a cell phone, keep the gas tank full, and let someone know where you're going. If your car gets stuck, don't wander off; it's best to wait for help.

After a winter storm: Avoid driving until conditions have improved. Avoid overexertion! Heart attacks from shoveling snow are the leading cause of deaths during the winter. Remember to check on neighbors, especially the elderly, to make sure they're okay.

Hypothermia...Protecting yourself from dangerously cold temperatures

In Missouri, 416 people have died from the cold since 1979. When exposed to cold temperatures, your body loses heat faster than it can be produced. Hypothermia occurs at very cold temperatures, but can occur at cool temperatures (above 40°F) if a person becomes chilled from rain, sweat, or submersion in cold water.

Anyone—at any age or physical condition—can be a hypothermia victim.

Warning signs include:

Adults: shivering/exhaustion, confusion/fumbling hands, memory loss/slurred speech and drowsiness.

Infants: bright red, cold skin, very low energy. If you suspect hypothermia, take the person's temperature. If below 95°, get medical attention immediately.

If medical care is not available get victim into a warm room or shelter, remove wet clothing, warm center of body first. Keep the victim dry; wrap in a warm blanket, including the head and

Winter driving


When the weather gets bad, accidents do happen. Please follow these tips to keep you and your car safe.

- SLOW DOWN! This is the biggest cause of weather related crashes. When streets are slippery it takes longer to stop.
- Leave at least five car lengths between you and the car in front of you.

 This could keep you from hitting the car in front of you.

- Be prepared to stop. Look ahead for problems and be prepared to stop if necessary.
- If you have an accident, contact the Columbia Police Department immediately. If your vehicle is in a dangerous position, move to a safe area.

Siren project underway

Approved by voters in a November 2005 public safety ballot issue, our city's \$310,000 outdoor warning siren project is now underway. Twentyone sirens will be replaced with new units, and some will be repositioned to make coverage more effective.

The first Wednesday of every month, Joint Communications transmits the noon-time signal that initiates the familiar siren test. Validating each siren's sounding presently requires an hour of phone calls. The new sirens, however, have a two-way reporting system that sends diagnostic information back to Joint Communications, indicating whether the system is working properly. Regular tests will continue, and the new capability will streamline the process.

Blue Valley Public Safety, which was awarded the bid by the City of Columbia, began the work of removing and replacing sirens in mid-October.


