Volunteer adopters agree to care for their beds for four years and are responsible for weeding, watering, mulching, and planting bulbs and annual flowers.

# FASTPass – Your Ticket to Ride!

Forget juggling tickets. Quit waiting for next month's pass. Columbia Transit's new FASTPass is your ticket to ride. Using Smart Card technology, FASTPass gives you five options for paying your fare:

- 30-Day Unlimited, full-fare or half-fare
- 7-Day Unlimited, student
- Pre-loaded 25-Ride, full-fare or half-fare

Unlimited-ride passes are good for 7 or 30 calendar days from first use, so you can buy them anytime. When you swipe your FASTPass card in the fare box, the number of rides or days remaining on your pass will be displayed on the fare box screen. Fare boxes will still accept change. # VoIP and 9-1-1 Service

"9-1-1; what is the address of your emergency?" - That's what you should hear when you dial 9-1-1. However, if you make the call using VoIP—Voice over Internet Protocol (a high-speed broadband internet connection via DSL or cable modem), be aware your call might not reach the desired 9-1-1 Call Center. Understanding the limitations of VoIP and taking certain precautions will help you avoid the unexpected when dialing 9-1-1 for help.

Subscribers to an interconnected VoIP service should

- Have a clear understanding of any limitations of your 9-1-1 service
- Find out the service provider's procedure for updating your address
- Provide an accurate physical address to your provider
- Inform children, babysitters, and visitors about your VoIP service and its 9–1–1 limitations
- If power is out or the broadband connection is down, your VoIP service may be down, too. Consider a backup power supply, traditional phone, or cell phone.

Every year, during National Telecommunicators Week, Columbia/Boone County Public Safety Joint Communications (PSJC) employees cast their votes for the Operator of the Year. This year, Scott Patterson was recognized by his peers for outstanding service, performance and professionalism.

During an informal gathering in the 9-1-1 Call Center, PSJC Director James McNabb presented Scott with a handsomely engraved plaque-amid applause, compliments, cake, and punch. On hand in a show of appreciation were Columbia police officers, firefighters, and Boone County Commissioners Karen Miller and Keith Schnarre.



# The 9-1-1 Call Process

9-1-1 lines are for emergency calls to report a crime in progress, a fire, or to request an ambulance. The caller will be asked the location of the emergency and the phone number they can be reached at, in addition to the type of the emergency. In this way, the 9-1-1 operator confirms essential information with the caller as well as determines the appropriate priority and response needs of the caller.

Using 9-1-1 for non-emergency calls may delay arrival of help for people caught in real emergencies. If you dialed 9-1-1 in error, explain to the dispatcher that you dialed by mistake and that you do not have an emergency. If you hang up, a dispatcher will call back to confirm that there is no emergency. If you don't answer, or even if you say everything's all right, a police officer may be dispatched to confirm that you are okav.

# What is a NOAA (National Oceanic & Atmospheric Administration) Weather Radio?

NWR is a 24-hour, all-hazards radio network– the most comprehensive weather and emergency information available to the public. Features available include:

- Tone alarm: the National Weather Service's tone alarm preceding warning or watch messages can activate the receiver even if the audio is turned off, which is especially useful at night while you're asleep.
- SAME (Specific Area Message Encoding): allows your receiver to respond only to alerts issued for the area(s) you have selected.
- Battery backup: ensures you'll stay informed even during a power outage, which often occurs with storms.

# Air conditioning efficiency tips

Save money on your bills and still be comfortable in your house this summer!

- Maintain your heating and cooling system by replacing air filters at least four times a year.
- Set the thermostat no lower than 78 degrees and turn it up a few degrees when the house is unoccupied.
- Leave window shades that receive direct sunlight down during the day.
- Try to use the oven, dishwasher and other appliances that produce heat during the late evening and early morning.
- Wear comfortable, loose-fitting clothes.
- Keep fireplace chimney dampers closed.
- Insulated attics need proper ventilation so they can 'breathe'.
- Consider moving your extra refrigerator or freezer out of the garage to the basement and your appliance won't have to work so hard to stay cool.
- Don't block vents and air returns with furniture, drapes or rugs.

### Outside water efficiency tips

Up to 60% of summer water consumption is used outdoors on landscaping. By using the water conservation techniques outlined below, you might be surprised by a better looking yard and lower water bills.

- Watering thoroughly, but infrequently, develops a deep root system so plants can use moisture and nutrients deep in the ground.
- Water according to moisture in the soil; not a fixed schedule.
- Lawns are dry when footprints remain in the grass long after being made.
- Lawns need only one inch of water per week; approximately three times a week for 20 minutes.
- Use a tuna can or a rain gauge to accurately measure the amount of water your irrigation system delivers
- Set a timer as a reminder to turn off the sprinkler.
- Water in the early morning from 6 a.m. to 8 a.m., avoiding windy conditions.
