

In the early 1980s, city leaders were scrambling. They heard that Norfolk Southern planned to discontinue rail service on the branch line from Centralia to Columbia. No other providers would

offer service without charging the city a fee and Columbia needed rail service. Rail

service is an important part of a community's transportation system. It is an economically and environmentally friendly way of shipping large commodities. Manufacturers depend on it. With no other viable alternatives, Columbia purchased the rail line in October 1987.

Under Columbia Water and Light, the Columbia Terminal Railroad (COLT) has become a valuable tool for retaining busi-

ness and attracting new industries to the area. Since 1987, rail business has grown from 600 carloads per year in 1987 to over 2,500 in 2007.

ADS Logisitics, the privately owned transload facility opened in 2004, enables more manufacturers in our area to take advantage of rail service. Heavy commodities are delivered to the facility where they can be stored and/or trucked directly to customers in the region.

# Highway 63 railroad crossing update

The section of Highway 63 that intersects with the COLT railroad tracks on the north side of town will become an exempt crossing. Vehicles carrying hazardous materials and school buses will no longer be required to stop. This is the first measure to make the railroad crossing less hazardous to motorists. Drivers still need to use caution when approaching the tracks. The option of constructing an overpass for the train has been researched and funding for the project is being pursued.

Ninth graders at Jefferson Junior High School (JJHS) have proven themselves to be accomplished artists and as a result their school will never be the same. The collaboration produced site-specific public art for the school's main lobby entryway where all students, teachers, parents and visitors will see it. The residency was coordinated by the city's Office of Cultural Affairs (OCA) as part of an ongoing effort to involve the community in the Percent for Art program. # Columbia receives 2008 Cultural Diversity Award

The City of Columbia was presented a National League of Cities' (NLC) and National Black Caucus of Local Elected Officials (NBC-LEO) 2008 City Cultural Diversity Award, which recognizes community efforts to enhance and celebrate cultural diversity, March 10 at the annual "Celebrate Diversity" Breakfast at NLC's Congressional City Conference in Washington, D.C.

The award recognizes the Columbia Values Diversity Breakfast and Columbia Values Diversity Awards. The breakfast and awards ceremony occur annually on the Thursday before the nation celebrates Martin Luther King Jr.'s birthday. The Columbia Values Diversity Awards are presented to citizens whose work exemplifies the life and teachings of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. by fostering individual dignity, racial equality, understanding, peacemaking and solving problems through non-violence. The City's Office of Community Services manages both programs, in conjunction with the Human Rights Commission, Columbia Values Diversity Celebration Planning Committee and Let's Talk Columbia volunteers.

"City staff and community partners work hard to create an event that crosses cultural barriers, invites inclusiveness and celebrates diversity," said Mayor Darwin Hindman. "It is gratifying that such an esteemed national organization has recognized their efforts."

The NLC/NBC-LEO City Cultural Diversity Awards were established in 1995 to promote cultural diversity in community governance through citizen and community participation. Winning cities are selected from a pool of applicants and are grouped according to population. Columbia was the winner in the 20,000 – 100,000 population group.

# Disposing of medications

Open: first and third Saturdays, April through November, 9 a.m. to 1 p.m.

#### Alternate Method

- 1. Keep products in their original container. (Remove label or conceal information with a permanent marker.)
- 2. To make the drug unusable, add a small amount of water to a solid drug and recap the container. For liquids, add some absorbent material such as kitty litter, sawdust or flour.
- 3. Place the container in another container or a heavy bag.
- 4. Place item in the trash.
