The City's 60th annual Fourth of July Fire in the Sky event will have a new home this year. Due to renovations at Memorial Stadium, the

event will move to The District. Activities and entertainment will begin at 6:30 p.m. This free event will be held July 4.

Children's activities and entertainment will be at Flat Branch Park, Fourth & Cherry St. The entertainment main stage is planned for MU's Peace Park on Elm between Sixth and Eighth streets. Fireworks will begin after 9 p.m. and will be launched from the top of the parking garage at Sixth and Cherry.

City Council

The Columbia City Council election for Ward 2 and Ward 6 was held April 3. Sixth Ward Councilwoman Barbara Hoppe was elected to a third term. Michael Trapp was elected to represent the Second Ward.

Both took their oaths of office at a special meeting April 16.

Trapp replaces Jason Thornhill, who did not run for re-election.

Fireworks Safety

With July 4 approaching, the Columbia Police Department would like to remind everyone that it is illegal to shoot fireworks inside the city limits. Violating the ordinance can result in the confiscation of your fireworks and being issued a city summons.

If you plan to shoot fireworks outside the city limits, keep the following safety tips in mind:

- Shoot fireworks at a safe distance from structures and other people.
- Never relight a "dud" firework.
- Always keep a hose or bucket of water handy.
- Children under age 12 should not handle fireworks and should not shoot fireworks without the supervision of an adult.
- Pets are often frightened by fireworks so keep them away from this activity.
- Never consume alcohol while handling fireworks.

If you are looking for a safe alternative to shooting fireworks, attend the City of Columbia fireworks display in The District July 4.

Changes to City's utility assistance programs

In order to improve customer service and make the City's utility assistance program more accessible and equitable, the Columbia/Boone County Department of Public Health and Human Services – Division of Human Services recently changed the way utility assistance is delivered to residents.

Effective May 1, utility assistance will be provided using a random selection process, rather than the telephone system that was previously in place. Customers now simply submit an application once a year and are entered into a pool for possible monthly selection. Program eligibility guidelines remain the same. Applications are available at:

City wins 20 computer tablets through Box Mobile Giveaway

When City Information Technologies Director Bob Simms learned of a contest from a company offering the chance to win 20 Samsung Galaxy Tab computers for the City, he jumped at the opportunity. On March 22, Simms learned that his was the chosen entry in the Box Mobile Giveaway.

Box, a California-based company, provides cloud data storage and enterprise collaboration tools. According to its website, Box was founded on the idea that people should be able to access and share their content from anywhere. The company strives to reinvent what businesses can do with their content through its content sharing platform.

The City not only received the tablet computers but also a year of Box, which includes 20 Box Enterprise accounts offering free unlimited storage and file sharing.

Box received 1,194 entries for the giveaway. Applicants had to explain in 200 words or less how they would benefit from winning. Simms' entry included the following.

"Mobile devices – especially tablets – are becoming necessary to provide answers, complete inspections and give surveys," he said. "This only works if the employee has access to the most up-to-date information. We're a city government looking to become more efficient at providing services to citizens."

Representatives from Box officially presented the award to Simms at the April 16 City Council meeting and then spent about three hours offering training to City staff the following day. The Health Department's Animal Control Division, Community Development's Office of Neighborhood Services, Police, Fire, Water & Light, Public Works and Information Technologies were all issued the devices.

"Box and mobile devices will make the difference between providing a service quickly and efficiently and making a customer come in to a government center and wait," Simms added.

Box will promote how winning the contest has transformed the organization by sharing videos and blog posts at box.com in the coming months.

Adopt-A-Spots brighten Columbia

Columbia has more than 90 Adopt-A-Spots located throughout the City and cared for by volunteers. The spots are landscaped areas in city or state right of ways that can be found at intersections, in roundabouts and in medians.

The City supports the work of volunteers with plants and mulch while volunteers share their time and hard work to keep them looking beautiful. The City also provides a sign to recognize the work of the volunteer and water where it is available.

The City frequently adds new beds to the program, as they are created through street projects, so new adopters are always needed. There are also other ways to support the program including donating plants, assisting with bed reviews and helping with water hydrants.

Deadly Flash: Lightning Dangers

One of the deadliest dangers posed by severe weather is lightning. The National Weather Service says that on average, 62 people are killed each year by lightning. Seventy-three percent of lightning-related injuries and deaths occur in June, July and August. Although some victims are struck directly by the lightning discharge, many are struck as the current moves in and along the ground.

WHEN LIGHTNING IS OBSERVED—

Avoid contact with electrical equipment or cords. Unplug appliances and other electrical items.

- Avoid water. Do not wash your hands, take a shower, wash dishes or do laundry.
- Plumbing and bathroom fixtures can conduct electricity.
- Avoid natural lightning rods, such as a tall, isolated tree in an open area.
- Avoid hilltops, open fields, the beach or a boat on the water.
- Stay away from farm equipment, motorcycles, golf carts, golf clubs and bicycles. For complete information on lightning safety, click on the lightning link on the Office of Emergency Management's page of the City's website at www.GoColumbiaMo.com/EM.
