

Council action

The Council on July 3:

- Accepted an emergency shelter grant program contract in the amount of \$75,000 the state of Missouri, Family Support Division, and authorized agreements with various human service agencies. The resolution authorizes the city manager to enter into agreements with Comprehensive Human Services Inc., Salvation Army and Welcome Home Inc. to provide services to the homeless.

The Council on July 17:

- Authorized the city manager to submit a Downtown Revitalization Economic Assistance for Missouri (DREAM) application to the state of Missouri. The goal of the DREAM initiative is to assist several select Missouri communities in re-establishing a sense of place and cultural heritage in the heart of the community and to attract private investment and new jobs. If selected as a DREAM city, the community will have some access to technical, financial and planning assistance from the Missouri Department of Economic Development, the Missouri Development Finance Board and the Missouri Housing Development Commission.
- Authorized a program agreement with the Missouri Highways and Transportation Commission relating to the nonmotorized pilot project. In July 2005, Columbia was selected by the Federal Highway Administration to receive a \$25 million Nonmotorized Transportation Pilot Program grant. The program aims to increase the frequency of bicycling and walking, decrease congestion and energy use and promote better health and a cleaner environment. The federal earmark for Fiscal Year 2006 is \$4 million to be used for 10 intersection improvements and to hire a program coordinator to help with the administration.

Water for the Future

Water Treatment Plant Open House

Join Columbia Water and Light for the dedication of the newly expanded plant. Tours will be available.

Wednesday, October 18, 2006
4 p.m. to 6 p.m.

Directions: Travel south on Providence Road/Highway K for approximately 10 miles past Stadium Boulevard. The Columbia Water Treatment Plant is on the north side of the highway, right before the Katy Trail parking lot.

The Columbia water system is gearing up for the future by making system upgrades as promised with the 2003 bond issue. The first part of the process, the water treatment plant, will be completed this fall. This expansion will provide the capacity to produce 32 million gallons a day to Columbia customers.

To bring treated water to Columbia, a second large transmission water line will be constructed this winter. This line will enable more water to be pumped to Columbia and will also serve as a back up for the existing transmission line.

Other water distribution system improvements include an additional pump station on the northeast side of Columbia (including an additional I-70 crossing), replacing and upgrading older water mains and fire hydrants. All of these water system improvements will keep the water flowing to Columbia residents, when and where they need it, 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

Halloween may be a fun holiday for kids, but for parents it can be somewhat spooky. Concerns for children's safety while trick or treating can be troubling for Mom or Dad. The Community Services Unit at the Columbia Police Department would like to remind parents of the following safety tips for having a fun-filled Halloween.

- Make sure all costumes are flame resistant
- Keep costumes short to prevent tripping
- Use makeup instead of masks that may obstruct the child's vision
- Put reflective tape on costumes so drivers can see them
- Always trick or treat in groups. A parent should accompany small children
- Only stop at familiar homes where outside lights are on
- Never enter a stranger's house or a stranger's car
- Trick or treat while it's still light; if dark use a flashlight
- Parents should always check all of the treats at home in a well-lighted place
- Eat only unopened candies and treats
