Back to School Safety

Summer vacation is over and it's time to go back to school! Here at the Columbia Police Department we tell parents to talk about safety issues at least three times a year. The best times to talk to your children are just before going back to school, Halloween and just before the start of summer. Listed below are some tips to share with your children.

- If your children are walking to school, find other students their age to walk with them.
- Talk to your children about strangers.
- Tell your children to never go into a stranger's house.
- •Tell your children never to go with a stranger on foot or in a stranger's
- Talk to your children about staying on well-walked and driven road-
- Talk to your children about traffic safety.
- Train your children not to answer the phone and to use the answering machine or caller ID.
- Train your children not to answer the door for strangers.
- Train your children about when to call 911 and to report suspicious
- Report to your school who is allowed to pick up your child from school.

Please remember that most children under the age of 8 have a difficult time understanding the concept of danger and the issue of stranger danger. For this reason you must practice constant supervision!!!!

Incentive Program for Businesses **Cuts Lighting Costs**

In a typical commercial building, about half the energy used by lighting is wasted in inefficient use, obsolete light fixtures or insignificant maintenance. Columbia Water and Light has started a new program to help businesses control lighting costs. The Lighting Incentive program offers business customers rebates to cover the costs of upgrading lighting fixtures. These upgrades cut electric demand which help the business and the utility save money by conserving resources.

The goal of the Lighting Incentive program is to lower Columbia's annual electric demand which reduces the system's peak demand. This lessens the utility's need to purchase higher priced peaking power on the wholesale market. This saves Columbia Water and Light money which helps fund the rebates to the businesses for installing more efficient lighting.

Columbia Water and Light's Lighting Incentive program 'buys' lighting efficiency from business customers with high electric demand in the following manner:

- •Columbia Water and Light staff make recommendations on how to increase the business's lighting efficiency.
- •To qualify for a rebate, a business's new lighting system has to be at least a 10 kilowatt reduction from the old lighting system.
- •The program will provide an incentive rebate payment of one half the cost of the lighting retrofit, or \$100 per kilowatt (KW) of reduction, whichever is less.
- •The Lighting Incentive program is offered to customers who pay an electric demand charge: Large General Service (rate "D") customers and Industrial Service (rate "I") customers.

For example, under the program, if a customer upgrades his/her lighting system at a cost of \$6,000 and reduces electric consumption by 20 kilowatts, then he/she will be reimbursed \$2,000 by Columbia Water and Light.

Council Action

The Council on June 6:

- •Authorized acquisition of land for expansion of the Wabash Station Renovation Project. The property, fronted on Orr Street, is part of the Master Plan prepared for the Wabash Transit Center. The warehouse on the property will be razed and the land will be incorporated into the Wabash Station Renovation Project.
- •Authorized renewal of a contract with the Central Missouri Humane Society for animal control services. The city contracts annually with the Humane Society for office space, utilities, daytime reception and dispatch, kennel facilities and veterinary medical services. The \$81,289 contract amount was included in the Fiscal Year 2005 Animal Control

The Council on June 20:

- •Authorized construction of improvements at Nifong Park and called for bids through the Purchasing Division. The 2004 budget included \$146,000 for this. Funding comes from the 1999 1/4-cent sales tax. The improvements will include a new restroom and building improvements to the two barns.
- •Authorized an agreement with First States Investors 5000A, LLC for lease of office space at 800 Cherry Street at \$9 per square-foot (includes utilities, maintenance of common space and some parking). The space is necessary due to current overcrowding in the Finance Department and Public Works and will be transition space during the renovation/expansion of the Daniel Boone Building.

CONSERVE COLUMBIA!

Now is the perfect time to cut your utility costs by tuning up your home with a few simple projects.

Insulate! Check the attic, outside walls or next to unheated areas, floors above unheated areas, foundation walls. Water and Light recommends R-38 (about 12 inches) in ceilings and R-19 (about 6 inches) in floors over unheated spaces.

- Install storm windows and doors.
- Weatherstrip and caulk! Check for drafts around windows, door frames, foundation cracks, electrical outlets, etc.
- Replace air filters on your heating and cooling system often and perform regular maintenance. Clean dust and lint away from appliances (heat-
- ing/cooling unit, refrigerators, water heaters, etc.) regularly so the motors run more efficiently.
- Tighten gaskets on the doors of refrigerators and

Stephens Lake Park

Dedicated on June 26

A ribbon-cutting ceremony to dedicate Stephens Lake Park was held Sunday, June 26. The crowd braved the heat to enjoy a variety of activities and the formal dedication of the park.

Live music was provided by the bluegrass band, Ironweed. The crowd also enjoyed canoe and kayak demonstrations and rides by The Alpine Shop, kite demonstrations by the Funky Fliers Kite Club, fishing demonstrations by Bass Pro Shops, children's activities, and a scavenger walk on the park's perimeter trail.

The ribbon-cutting followed at 2 pm with comments by Mayor Darwin Hindman, City Manager Ray Beck, Parks and Recreation Director Mike Hood and Michael Sleadd, repre-

senting the citizens' group, Coalition to Save Stephens Lake Park. The Chamber of Commerce Ambassadors officiated at the ribbon-cutting.

Though much of the work on the park is complete, parks and recreation staff are continuing to finish a number of items under the park's master plan, which is intended to be a long-range development plan. Stephens Lake Park features hard surface trails, a free swimming beach, fishing lake, picnic shelters, a pier and boardwalk extending across the lake, playgrounds, climbing boulder and an open playfield.

The Parks staff is working to complete an indoor shelter which will be available for summer programs and public rental. The shelter is slated for completion later this year.

Future plans include an amphitheater in the western area of the park, a sprayground and a bathhouse area by the swimming beach. Arboretum features planned for the park include demonstration gardens, various tree collections, a wetlands demonstration area, a prairie restoration area and a waterfall.

Artist Carol Fleming was selected by the City's Standing Committee on Public Art and Commission on Cultural Affairs to create site-specific public art for the park as part of the Percent for Art program. Her ceramic sculpture, called Look Out Point, is located near the amphitheater site. The 12 components form a spiral and create a space for personal reflection or use as a gathering place. The work is meant to represent growth, hope and joy. Clay was used because of its connection to the earth and the natural setting of the Park.
