

Fight the flu this fall

Kids are back in school and the leaves are starting to change, a good indication that flu season is just around the corner. Columbia/Boone County Public Health and Human Services reminds you that getting flu vaccine for yourself and your family will help prevent flu-related illness, missed school and missed work.

Free flu vaccine will be available to all Boone County children (age 18 and under) this year, thanks to University of Missouri Children's Hospital and the David B. Lichtenstein Foundation, with additional assistance from Boone Electric Community Trust and Boonslick Kiwanis Club of Columbia. Beginning in October, Public Health and Human Services nurses will offer free flu vaccine to kindergarten - seventh graders in Boone County's public and private schools. Any child age 18 and under will also be able to get free flu vaccine at the department's clinic, located at 1005 West Worley. Adult vaccine (age 19 and over) will be available for a fee.

When flu vaccine becomes available, it will be offered without an appointment. Visitors center moves to City Hall

Since 2003, volunteers with the Columbia Hospitality Corps have been welcoming visitors from all over the world at the Lake of the Woods Visitors Center on the east side of Columbia. This fall, the visitors center will move to the lobby of City Hall at 701 E. Broadway.

The new City Hall Visitors Center will be open on Friday and Saturday during September with plans to be open Monday through Saturday starting in October. Visitors and residents alike can stop by the center to find out more about Columbia attractions and events while enjoying a cup of coffee.

The center will continue to be staffed by volunteers. In 2011, 50 volunteers shared nearly 3,000 hours of service to staff the center. The City is looking for more volunteers so the center can be open at all times. Volunteer training is scheduled for Thursday, Oct. 25, 6-9 p.m. at City Hall; volunteers should apply and agree to a background check.

Over-Occupancy - Know the Code

Two's a party and three's a crowd. Four or more may be a violation of City code. Columbia's zoning ordinance limits the number of unrelated people living together in a dwelling unit to three in R-1 and PUD (when the PUD development density is five or less dwelling units per acre) zoning and four in other zoning districts.

Over occupancy leads to increased noise, traffic, trash and safety issues for residents. This issue is of particular concern in single-family residential neighborhoods. It is the responsibility of both landlords and occupants to comply with this ordinance.

The penalty for non-compliance is steep. The owner, manager and occupant can all be charged with violations in municipal court. Rental property risks losing its certificate of compliance and will be required to be inspected on a frequent basis to ensure the violation has been remedied.

Columbia residents who suspect over occupancy in a home should report that to the Office of Neighborhood Services at 817-5050.



September Volunteers of the Month: JobPoint



JobPoint is a not-for-profit employment center and community development corporation. The organization prepares individuals who are having difficulty obtaining or maintaining employment to enter the workforce by providing career planning and job placement assistance. Not only is JobPoint helping many of its participants gain economic independence, but the participants are making a difference in the community through their volunteer work.

Some of the volunteer work JobPoint participants have done for the City of Columbia since 2003 includes cleaning up watersheds and creeks, improving and restoring rain gardens at fire stations, planting trees, removing brush, improving water quality at Cosmo park, spreading mulch, picking up trash and building retention basins. They also volunteer with many other local organizations.

These volunteer opportunities expose participants to new skills and alternative ideas and create a sense of pride. Volunteering allows JobPoint participants the “opportunity to give back to the community in which they live,” Gary Taylor, director of Youthbuild at JobPoint explained. “It helps to build self esteem through a sense of accomplishment and it allows our students to see how they really can make a difference in their own community. Many of our students are filled with so much pride whenever they complete a project in the community.”

Sewer Ordinance Change

The City Council approved bill 160-12 during its July 16 meeting, making a change to ordinance 22-263(b) as it relates to the calculation of the winter quarter average and establishing a minimum use charge of 2 CCF for accounts that do not have the appropriate number of billing periods necessary for calculating a winter quarter average. The winter quarter average will be calculated using the average monthly billing of water usage for the billing periods November through March, dropping the highest and lowest usage months. If the usage calculated is less than 1, a recalculation will be done using the water usage for the previous 12-month billing periods of April through March. This change becomes effective Oct. 1, 2012. Customers who believe their account has been inaccurately billed may complete a utility customer service complaint form and submit it to the finance director for evaluation.
