# Cleanup Columbia 2015

Cleanup Columbia 2015 will be held Saturday, April 11, and all residents are invited to participate! Cleanup Columbia is a citywide trash pickup event where hundreds of local residents work together to make the city a more beautiful place.

The City will provide volunteers with trash bags, gloves, safety vests (where needed) and help them find a trash pickup location. Volunteers pick up trash in the morning and are asked to start no later than 10 a.m. Columbia Public Works will pick up filled bags.

The event is suited for individuals and groups of all sizes and people of all ages and abilities. There will be a thank-you picnic, sponsored by APAC-Missouri, at Twin Lakes Recreation Area to celebrate afterwards. T-shirts will be provided to volunteers, while supplies last.

# Renewable energy target exceeded


Columbia voters passed an ordinance in 2004 mandating that Columbia Water & Light provide electricity from increasing amounts of renewable energy. Last year, Columbia's renewable electric supply came from landfill gas, wind, biomass and solar. The amount supplied in 2014 was 7.22 percent, which is higher than the mandate of 5 percent.

# Some of the 2014 highlights:

- An outside firm specializing in electric rates was hired to evaluate the methodology used to determine the costs associated with renewable energy. It was suggested that a capacity credit be used to show when the power resource is available. This cost accounting methodology was approved by the Water & Light Board.
- A request for proposals for additional photovoltaic panels at the West Ash pump station was issued.
- There was a 40 percent increase in the rated capacity of customer-installed photovoltaic systems.
- Solar energy loans were made available to customers for photovoltaic systems and solar water heaters.

As outlined in the renewable energy ordinance, the cost cannot cause electric rates to increase more than 3 percent. For calendar year 2014, the additional cost for the renewable portfolio was \$1.12 million and the limit was \$3.29 million. The extra money spent on renewable energy was 34.25 percent of what was allowed according to the ordinance.

### Street Talk

In late 2014, a citizen survey was conducted by ETC Institute to gauge citizen satisfaction with the services provided by the City of Columbia.

The City would like to thank everyone who completed the survey. The Public Works Department is pleased that in the area of city streets, customer satisfaction has improved.

Some of the highlights from the survey concerning streets include:

- Satisfaction of the overall condition of City streets rose 12 percent.
- Satisfaction of maintenance efforts of major City streets rose 10 percent.
- Satisfaction of maintenance of residential streets rose 6 percent.
- Satisfaction of traffic-calming efforts rose 8 percent.

Columbia Public Works would like to thank its customers for their continuous support in the department's efforts to maintain and improve Columbia's roadways. # New dedicated pickleball courts at Albert-Oakland Park



# West-central Columbia neighborhood plan underway

Residents, near neighbors and other stakeholders are hard at work on a neighborhood action plan for the west-central area of Columbia, roughly bounded by Broadway on the south, McBaine and Sexton on the east, Business Loop 70 on the north and Stadium on the west. The plan will identify neighborhood needs and priorities related to land use, transportation, infrastructure and community character.

There will be multiple opportunities to provide input and feedback during the planning process, which will be ongoing through March and April. Neighborhood planners are also asking residents to consider leadership and advocacy roles for neighborhood plan development, adoption and beyond.

# Police ask residents to help prevent burglaries during spring break

Don't be victim to a burglary this spring break! The Columbia Police Department (CPD) reminds residents to prepare for extended absences.

In the days leading up to your absence, do not announce it on social media or in voice mail or email. Arrange for pickup and/or stop delivery of mail, newspapers and packages. Ask a trusted friend, neighbor or family member to check on your residence while you are away. Give your residence the appearance that someone is home by leaving ample exterior and interior lights on, or use timers. Ensure all windows and doors are secure and disable automatic garage doors.

Additionally, CPD encourages residents to visit the City's website at *GoColumbiaMo.com/Police* to take advantage of the property inventory spreadsheet. This spreadsheet allows residents to list all valuable items with their serial numbers and should be stored in a safe place for reference. ## **Code Corner**

House numbers help visitors and delivery people find your home; they are also essential in helping fire or police personnel get there in an emergency. City code requires that premises have identification of contrasting numbers or letters a minimum of 4 inches in height and a minimum stroke width of 1/2 inch. Existing house numbers that are 2 inches in height are acceptable until they need to be replaced.

# **Budget Billing**

Utility Customer Service (UCS) would like to remind customers that March is the enrollment month for the budget billing program. Through budget billing, customers pay the same amount each month. Sometimes the budgeted amount is higher than the actual bill, and sometimes it's lower. Once a year, during March, accounts are reviewed to see if customers have overpaid or underpaid, and adjustments are made accordingly.

To qualify, customers must have been at the address for a minimum of 12 months and be current in their payments. Find out more about budget billing at GoColumbiaMo.com. Detailed information is also on the tear-off flap of the return envelope included with the March utility bill. Use the tear-off flap to enroll, or submit an application online.
