Pools open for the summer

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Don't miss the fun at Columbia's pools this summer. The pools open in late May. Douglass Family Aquatic Center will feature a \$1 admission price for patrons 2 and older. Recreation swim prices at other outdoor aquatic facilities are free for age 1 and under, \$2.50 for 2-15 year-olds and \$3.75 for patrons 16 and older. Admission after 5 p.m. is \$1.75.


Coupon books for 20 visits are available for \$37.50 for children (2-15) and \$56.25 for those 16 and older. Season passes are available for \$220 for a family of up to five, \$115 for an adult and \$70 for a youth.

Appropriate swim attire is required to enter all aquatic facilities and is defined as clothing specifically designed for use in the water (swim trunks or swimsuits). Examples of inappropriate attire include basketball shorts, cutoffs, sports bras, sweatpants and cargo shorts.

One man's trash is another man's treasure!

For many people, setting items out for the trash truck is easier than thinking about what actually happens to those items or how they could benefit others. However, you can recycle more than you think, and the more you recycle, the less trash gets dumped in the landfill. Please consider your options before sending items to the landfill.

BUILDING MATERIALS—

Remodeling? Reusable items such as furniture, doors, windows, cabinets and other building materials can be taken to the Habitat for Humanity's ReStore, 1906 Monroe St. Donations are accepted 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Monday through Friday and 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. Saturdays. Call 499-1202 if you have questions or check the website at http://www.showmehabitat.org/restore.php. The benefits are:

- Useable building materials are diverted from landfill sites.
- Items are sold to the general public at affordable prices or used to build Habitat homes.
- Contractors save on increasing landfill and disposal fees.

Businesses save storage costs while clearing out discontinued items/salvageable goods.
FURNITURE AND HOUSEHOLD ITEMS—

There are many local organizations with thrift stores that accept donations of reusable furniture and other household items. These items benefit many charity organizations. Check online or in the local telephone directory for a listing of thrift stores in the area. HAZARDOUS MATERIALS—

Materials such as paint, chemicals, antifreeze and cleaning products are banned from the landfill and need to be dropped off at the Household Hazardous Waste Facility, 1313 Lakeview Ave. The facility is open 8 a.m. to noon the first and third Saturdays, April through November. This is for residential use only; no commercial waste can be accepted. Hazardous waste products cannot be picked up curbside–and should **never** be put in storm drains.

Ever wonder what the City does with hazardous waste? Much of it is reusable. Items such as paint and chemicals are available to the public at the Swap Shed. The Swap Shed is open 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. Mondays and 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Tuesday through Friday at 1313 Lakeview Ave. The Swap Shed contains reusable items like cleaning products, pesticides and paint collected from household hazardous waste collection days, available for citizens free of charge. **OLD COMPUTERS, CRAFT ITEMS OR SPORTS EQUIPMENT—**

Non-profit organizations and other businesses can reuse these items. Please check the City's website at www.GoColumbiaMo.com (search: GoRecycling) for a list of more than 35 different categories—everything from appliances to yard waste.


USE THE BLUE BAGS—

Three times a year, residents with curbside pickup receive vouchers in the mail for blue bags. Please use them, and if you need more, request more. Simply place clean metal food cans, #1 and #2 plastics, glass bottles and jars and aluminum beverage cans in the bag. Cardboard and paper products should go in a cardboard box or paper bag. Set them curbside on your regular trash collection day and the City will do the rest. Don't have curbside collection? Many apartment complexes have recycling containers, plus there are 11 recycling drop-off sites throughout Columbia.

OVERSIZED ITEMS-

If you have an item that is oversized (such as furniture) and is truly beyond reusing, call the Solid Waste Division at 874-6291 to arrange for a special trash pickup. You can also email waste-mgmt@GoColumbiaMo.com. Please contact Solid Waste at least 48 hours prior to your scheduled refuse day.

Call 874-6291 if you would like a staff person to attend your neighborhood association or group meeting. Statistics show that 70 percent of the items in Columbia's landfill could have been recycled or reused.

Smith to receive Lang Volunteer Award



Robert C. Smith was selected to receive the fourth annual Howard B. Lang Jr. Award for Outstanding Volunteer Service to the City of Columbia. The award will be presented during the City's volunteer reception at noon Friday, May 18, at the Sunrise Optimist Club Building.

Robert c. Smith

Born in Fulton, and a 1940 graduate of Hickman High School, Smith was elected as

state representative in the Missouri Legislature in 1954, where he was the youngest speaker pro-tem in Missouri's history up to that time. He later served as mayor of Columbia from 1961-62.

Smith has been a leader in many civic organizations including the State Historical Society of Missouri, the Missouri Symphony Society, Stephens College, Kiwanis and the First Baptist Church. In those and other roles, he initiated action to preserve the Gordon tract, now known as Grindstone Park, worked on the planning of Columbia Regional Airport, led the effort to establish a legal aid program for indigent persons in the county and sponsored the first enabling legislation to establish the Missouri Human Rights Commission.

The selection committee for the annual Lang Award changes every year, but always includes the sitting mayor of Columbia. Mayor Bob McDavid says about this year's recipient, "It's an honor to support the Lang Award going to Bob Smith, who has been a fixture in Columbia sharing his time, energy and wisdom through City volunteer posts for over 60 years."

Past recipients of the Lang Award are Ed Kaiser, Darwin Hindman and Dave Griggs.

If you plan on digging on your property, it is important to call Missouri One Call for your utility services. By locating utility services before you dig, you can ensure there are no utility service disruptions and avoid a fine.

You are required to call for utility locates at least two working days, but not more than 10 days, before you start excavation. A violation of this is considered an infraction of the City of Columbia ordinance and could be subject to a fine. See City ordinance section 16-239 for details.

NOTE: Sewer and water lines will only be marked on the City side of the meter. Private lines running from the meter to a home are not located by the

Earth Hour Results

Columbia residents turned off lights and reduced electric consumption March 31 during the City's fifth annual Earth Hour event. Earth Hour is a symbolic "wave of darkness" that encircles the globe, encouraging hundreds of millions of people to participate in the largest single environmental event on the planet.

Columbia Water & Light estimates that the electric load from 8:30 to 9:30 p.m. March 31, resulted in a two megawatt drop in Columbia's electric consumption, equivalent to the amount of power used by almost 80 Columbia homes in an average day. Past years' reductions in the electric load were as follows:

- 2011 2.5 megawatt reduction
- 2010 1.58 megawatt reduction
- 2009 1.27 megawatt reduction
- 2008 1.72 megawatt reduction

Mayors Climate Protection Agreement Progress Report

The City of Columbia has released the Mayors Climate Protection Agreement Progress Report for 2012. The report details the steps taken to promote the 2006 City Council resolution to endorse the U.S. Mayors Climate Protection Agreement.

The Council's resolution (Section 107-468, Res. 160-06A) declares that the City will strive to meet or exceed Kyoto Protocol targets for reduction of global warming pollution. The 2012 progress report discusses 12 action items identified in the Council's resolution, explains their current status and grades the progress the City has taken to promote the action items. 

Keep Kids Safe and Healthy in the Summer

Summertime can bring a whole new set of safety challenges to children. Extra vigilance is required to prevent injury and keep kids safe and healthy. This summer, the Columbia/Boone County Department of Public Health and Human Services will offer a series of articles providing tips for parents:

■ HOME ALONE OR HIRE A BABYSITTER—

Every parent eventually faces the decision to leave their child home alone for the first time. Be sure your child has the skills and maturity to handle situations safely. Children face real risks when left unsupervised. Those risks, as well as a child's ability to deal with challenges, must be considered.

DEVELOP A FAMILY DISASTER PLAN—

Meet with your family and discuss why you need to prepare for disasters. Explain the dangers of fire, severe weather and earthquakes to children. Share responsibilities and work together as a team. Discuss the types of disasters that are most likely to happen. Explain what to do in each case.

■ KEEP YOUR KIDS ALCOHOL, DRUG AND TOBACCO FREE—

Unstructured time can lead to opportunities for experimentation. Despite the impact of movies, music and TV, parents can be the **greatest influence** in their kids' lives. Talk directly to your child about the risks and consequences of such behavior. Have conversations about your values and expectations while your child is young, so he or she will get used to sharing information and opinions with you. Knowing the facts will help your child make healthy choices.
