Check out the newly renovated Little Mates Cove this year! Improvements include new water features, deck and bridge, all meant to improve safety and fun at the water park.

Daily admission fees at Columbia's pools: \$1 for patrons 2 and older at Douglass, \$1.50 for ages 2-15 and \$2.75 for ages 16 and up at Lake of the Woods and Little Mates Cove, and \$2.50 for ages 2-15 and \$3.75 for ages 16 and up at Albert-Oakland. Twilight fee at Albert-Oakland is \$1.75 after 5 p.m. Infants age 1 and younger are admitted to facilities free.

Appropriate swim attire is required to enter all aquatic facilities and is defined as clothing specifically designed for use in the water (swim trunks or swimsuits). Examples of inappropriate attire include basketball shorts, cutoffs, sports bras, sweatpants and cargo shorts.

Columbia Water & Light earns awards **ELECTRIC RELIABILITY**

Columbia Water & Light received two awards from the American Public Power Association. The Reliable Public Power Provider (RP3) recognizes public power utilities that demonstrate proficiency in four key disciplines: reliability, safety, training and system improvement. Criteria within each category is based on sound business practices and represent a utility-wide commitment to the safe and reliable delivery of electricity. Columbia is one of 184 of the nation's more than 2,000 public power utilities to earn the RP3 recognition this year.

ENERGY EFFICIENCY & RENEWABLE EFFORTS

The utility also received the Award of Continued Excellence (ACE) from the American Public Power Association's Demonstration of Energy & Efficiency Developments (DEED) program. The award recognizes Columbia's continued commitment to research, development and demonstration in the areas of efficiency and renewable resources. Columbia has received multiple DEED grants—as well as a scholarship—and assisted in advancing energy efficiency and renewable energy programs. Columbia has done marketing research in the area of solar feed-in tariffs, is working on a collaborative biomass project and has been a leader in Missouri in the areas of residential and commercial energy efficiency.

TREELINE USA

Columbia Water & Light has been awarded the Arbor Day Foundation's Tree Line USA recognition for the 16th year. The program honors utilities for responsible tree trimming practices and programs to promote appropriate planting near utility lines. The award reaffirms Columbia Water & Light's commitment to safe, reliable electric service and abundant, healthy trees in the community.

Fireworks illegal in city limits

Before the July 4 holiday, the Columbia Police Department would like to remind residents that it is illegal to possess or shoot fireworks inside Columbia city limits. Violation of the ordinance can result in the confiscation of your fireworks and a summons to appear in municipal court.

Fireworks may be disposed of at the household hazardous waste (HHW) facility, 1313 Lakeview, between 8 a.m. — 12 p.m. on the first and third Saturdays of the month, April through November, or through the Columbia Fire Department by appointment at 874-7391.

If you plan to shoot fireworks outside the city limits, remember...

- Shoot fireworks at a safe distance from structures and other people.
- Never relight a "dud" firework.
- Always keep a hose or bucket of water handy.
- Children under age 12 should not handle fireworks and should not shoot fireworks without the supervision of an adult.
- Pets are often frightened by fireworks so keep them away from this activity.
- Never consume alcohol while handling fireworks.

Columbia's Rental Regulations

For more than 30 years, the City of Columbia has had a rental unit conservation law requiring that all residential rental properties meet code to help ensure the health and safety of the occupants. The City's Office of Neighborhood Services (ONS), a division of the Community Development Department, carries out this ordinance; more than 24,000 rental units are registered.

- **Property owners** must apply for a rental certificate of compliance. The process includes paying a fee, having gas appliances inspected and agreeing to have the unit inspected by the City to ensure the property meets code.
- Tenants have the right to rent a unit that complies with City code and has a current certificate of compliance. To verify this, tenants may ask their landlord or inquire with ONS. If there are maintenance issues with the property the landlord is not addressing, the tenant may file a complaint with ONS and allow a City inspector to view the problem. If a violation is found, the inspector will require the property owner to make necessary repairs.

Adopt-A-Spots bring beauty to Columbia

If you ride around Columbia, it doesn't take long to spot a green "Adopt A Spot" sign in one of the City's more than 90 beautification beds cared for by volunteers. As adopters, volunteers are asked to maintain a bed for four years, including weeding, mulching, watering, planting annual flowers and bulbs and sometimes installing new plant material. Hundreds of people enjoy the results of their efforts each day.

Parking meters get makeover

Color is being added to parking meters to make it easier to tell how long you can park in the metered space. This summer, the parking utility will place color-coded "bonnets" on each meter that will correspond with a time limit. For example, meters with a red bonnet allow you to park in the metered spot for two hours; yellow bonnets equal 24 minutes. Later this spring, an interactive map with information on metered parking spaces, as well as parking garages, will be introduced.

FREE energy saving upgrades for income qualified customers

Columbia Water & Light electric customers can make their homes more energy efficient through the Central Missouri Community Action. The service is **free** for income-qualified customers! This program helps families in need save money on their energy bills so it can be used on other pressing needs.

Do you qualify?

- Income has to be lower than the amounts listed in the table below.
- Must be a Columbia Water & Light electric customer
- Must own your home or have your landlord* agree to participate *Landlords: Partial funding is available for rental units with income-qualified tenants. This program will pay for 50 percent of the upgrade for single family homes and 30 percent for each multi-family unit.

What is covered?

As funding allows, you might qualify for these **free*** upgrades:

- Energy efficiency assessment (determines which upgrades are needed)
- Insulation (attic, wall, rim joist, ductwork and either crawlspace or floor over unconditioned spaces)
- Air & ductwork sealing

Additional funding from other sources **might** be available for other energy-efficiency improvements.

How do I apply?

Public Health and Human Services program recognized as leader in child abuse prevention

Boone County's Healthy Babies Program, a pregnancy support program staffed by social services specialists from the Columbia/Boone County Department of Public Health and Human Services, was recognized in April as a 2013 Leader in Child Abuse Prevention by Missouri Prevention Partners.

One of 28 programs across the state, Healthy Babies was honored for exemplary leadership in accepting the responsibility of child abuse prevention and taking steps to protect children in our community. Using the "Partners for a Healthy Baby" curriculum, Healthy Babies offers monthly home visits from a social services specialist and can help with cribs, clothing, diapers, WIC, food stamps, Medicaid and breastfeeding. The free, voluntary program is funded by the Missouri Children's Trust Fund and Public Health and Human Services.


"Our social services specialists develop meaningful relationships with the Healthy Babies families," said Public Health and Human Services Director Stephanie Browning. "They take very seriously their role in healthy child development and the prevention of child abuse and neglect. I'm confident that the advice and support they give these moms throughout pregnancy has a lasting effect in each family."

Window air conditioner exchange

for income-qualified customers

To help you save energy and money, Columbia Water & Light and the Voluntary Action Center are offering the Air Conditioner Exchange program for income-qualified electric customers.

Eligibility requirements are:

- being a current Columbia Water & Light electric customer;
- having an older less efficient and/or broken window unit to exchange; and
- having an annual income of less than 200 percent of the poverty level.

If you meet the above criteria and want a new window air conditioning unit, please call the Voluntary Action Center. There are a limited number of units to exchange so it is important to call before bringing in an older unit.

You must bring the following to participate:

- proof of your current physical Boone County address (IDs or leases will not be accepted);
- identification for everyone at your address (originals...no copies):
- proof of all income for everyone at your address (including food stamps and TANF);
- current utility bill for your address; and
- an older, inefficient window air conditioner to exchange.

Terri Watts was raised in a family that consistently helped others and did service projects, so it was natural for her to assist with Special Olympics in college. When a friend had a child with special needs, Watts became even more involved.

For the past 19 years, Watts has volunteered with the Special Olympics Sports Program through Columbia Parks and Recreation. A large group of volunteers comprise this program, serving and assisting the 272 active athletes.

Of the nine sports offered, Watts volunteers for eight. In the evenings, she coaches softball, basketball, tennis, volleyball and bowling. She also lends a hand with swimming, track and field, golf and the Summer Show Me Games and serves as a tennis partner to a Special Olympics athlete.

"She truly loves being a part of their lives," said Jody Cook, recreation specialist with Parks and Recreation. "She knows the athletes well. She understands each individual's idiosyncrasies and gifts, assisting them to perform to their maximum capacity."

While Watts inspires her athletes, she admits they also inspire her. "It is exciting to see them do things they didn't know they could do and reach goals they didn't know they could achieve, watching them open up and blossom," she said.

When do you need a building permit?

The permit and inspection process protects the current and future property owner by ensuring that the work adheres to adopted building codes.

Examples of projects requiring a permit include:

- moving a sink;
- constructing a deck;
- altering the footprint or roofline of your house;
- installing new electrical wiring;
- replacing your water heater, furnace or air conditioner; and
- laying a new roof.

Community helps provide winter shelter

The City of Columbia would like to thank the community members and organizations that once again provided winter weather emergency shelter for persons experiencing homelessness in the community. Two weeks of shelter were provided by the Imani Mission Center. The Columbia Interfaith Resource Center's Room at the Inn program, in partnership with Wilkes Boulevard United and Broadway Christian Church, provided nine weeks of shelter. The City of Columbia provided cots and overtime funding for Columbia Police Department officers to provide shelter security.

It is estimated that more than 123 people were served by more than 375 volunteers contributing more than 4,000 hours of service. Councilman Michael Trapp and City Manager Mike Matthes both offer their deep appreciation for the community's response to the need for winter weather emergency shelter.
