Preparation for New Transmission Lines

Open House to be held this summer





During summer, Columbia residents look to cool down by starting up their air conditioners. Columbia Water & Light (CWL) continually monitors electrical activity to ensure there aren't any problems. CWL is also preparing to reliably deliver electricity to Columbians in the future, while meeting strict federal standards and mandates through its initiative, The Columbia Electric Transmission Line Project.

The project includes a new substation and 161-kV transmission lines along a route that includes: Scott Boulevard, Vawter School Road, Nifong Boulevard and Grindstone Parkway.

Transmission line construction will not happen until 2017, but there has been plenty of activity along the route in preparation for the new lines. Here's a snapshot of the work taking place and what is coming up this summer:

- Surveying and Soil Testing: Routine surveying started in January and continues in the south Columbia neighborhoods along the route. This work is occurring primarily along public easements in the project corridor. Utility companies have also been in the area marking locations of utilities with flags. Soil testing started in late March, first taking place along Scott Boulevard, with other streets along the route following. If soil tests are taking place near you, or you see a utility locate flag, it does not mean a transmission pole will be placed there.
- **Determining Pole Placement**: Pole placement along the route has not been determined yet and won't occur until late 2015. Results of the surveying and soil testing will aid in the decision process about the placement and design of transmission poles and lines. There are a number of factors taken into consideration before a decision can be made, including:
 - working around underground utilities;
 - location of street intersections:
 - soil stability; and
 - easement rights and space/lengths between each pole.
- **Upcoming Open House**: Pole placement and design recommendations will be shared with the community and the City Council later in 2015. Look for an open house announcement this summer. Announcements will be posted on *PoweringColumbia.com* a website dedicated to The Columbia Electric Transmission Line Project.

Street Talk



Columbia Public Works is springing into a new construction season with more than 20 roadway, sidewalk, pedestrian safety and trail projects in the design and construction phase.

The Scott Boulevard Phase III Roadway Improvement project is scheduled to be underway by

this fall. Phase III will improve Scott Boulevard between Vawter School Road and State Route KK. Scott Boulevard Phase III is the last of three voter-approved projects to improve Scott Boulevard between Rollins Road and Route KK.

The College Avenue Safety Enhancement (CASE) project is scheduled to begin in May. This project consists of a median on College Avenue between University Avenue and Rollins Street with two dedicated pedestrian crossings controlled by pedestrian signals.

The MKT to Parkade Bike Boulevard project is scheduled for construction this year. This project includes four intersection improvements and pavement striping along a corridor that connects the MKT trail to the Parkade Plaza.

As construction season begins, Public Works asks motorists to please slow down in work zones, pay attention and don't become distracted, and find alternate routes when available. A complete list of current projects is available at GoColumbiaMo.com.

Water system improvement project



Using voter-approved funding, Columbia Water & Light is working on upgrading the water distribution system for the northwest side of town. Crews are replacing a 6-inch water line on Texas Avenue from Garth Avenue to Creasy Springs Road. This water main has been experiencing breaks and is approaching the end of its useful life. The existing pipe will be replaced with an 8-inch and 12-inch water main. The upgraded water line will increase the amount of water that can be delivered to the area for consumers and firefighting purposes. It will also increase the reliability of water service in the area.

The water project is being done in conjunction with street work and is expected to be finished in the fall. At times, there will be traffic lane restrictions or partial closures during the construction phase. If there are any water service disruptions during this project, customers will be individually notified.


Grant to fund restoration of historic Maplewood House awarded

The City of Columbia, working with the Boone County Historical Society, was awarded a \$14,400 grant by the Missouri State Historic Preservation Office to undertake restoration work on the 138-year-old, National Register-listed Maplewood House. The scope of work includes water damage, structural concerns and electrical issues. Maplewood is a part of the City's Nifong Park, and the home is operated and maintained by the Boone County Historical Society.

The Maplewood House is available for tours and functions by appointment. For more information on the Maplewood House and the Boone County Historical Society, visit boonehistory.org/museum/maplewood/.

Make sure you pay attention to the SEER (Seasonal Energy Efficiency Ratio) of the unit. In Columbia, a SEER rating of 15 or higher is recommended.

Utility Account Reminder

Utility Customer Service (UCS) reminds customers to keep utility account information current. Make sure UCS has a correct phone number and mailing address (if different from the service address). Call 874-7380, or email UCS@GoColumbiaMo.com.

As summer approaches, so does busy season for UCS. This may result in longer wait times on hold when customers call the office. By registering accounts online at *GoColumbiaMo.com*, customers gain 24-hour access to account information and may also pay bills online. UCS no longer processes applications for new residential service over the phone, so customers need to apply for service online or come to the office with a lease and two forms of ID. Terminating service or transferring service from one address to another may still be done with a phone call and may also be done from the website.

When terminating service, please provide UCS with a forwarding address, as the post office returns utility bills to the City rather than forwarding them. If UCS does not have a forwarding address, finalled accounts can fall delinquent, and may be sent to a collection agency after 60 days.

City moves forward with development code update project

The City of Columbia and hired consultants Clarion Associates and Ferrell Madden Associates continue work to prepare a comprehensive update of its land development codes, including but not limited to the Zoning Ordinance (Chapter 29) and Subdivision Regulations (Chapter 25). To date, the proposed code update has been presented in three modules and the consultants are addressing comments made by the public.
