

# City buses receive technology enhancements

Columbia Transit has entered into an agreement with DoubleMap® to provide technology enhancements on all City transit vehicles. The enhancements will occur in phases. The first phase, completed the week of July 15, consisted of the installation of Automatic Vehicle Location (AVL) devices and associated software. In mid-August, customers will be able to track Columbia Transit vehicles in real time via the City's website or the DoubleMap® app available from both the Apple Store or Google Play.

The next phase, scheduled for early fall, will include installation of passenger counters and annunciators that will advise riders of the next stop, estimated time, etc.

# Sidewalk project provides safe access to Parkade Park



A ceremony was held May 16 to dedicate the new sidewalk that now connects Delmar Cobble School with Parkade Park.

In November 2011, administrators at Delmar Cobble School, located on the corner of Garth Avenue and Craig Street, sent a request to the City of Columbia and Columbia Public Schools for a sidewalk between Delmar Coble School and Parkade Park, which is located just west of the school at Bear Creek Drive and Craig Street.

The students at Delmar Cobble have profound disabilities, including mobility issues, and many rely on the use of specialized devices. A safe, smooth, hard surface was required to allow students access to an outdoor area.

Throughout 2012, Columbia Public Works, Columbia Parks & Recreation, Columbia Public Schools and the City Council explored funding opportunities for this request. In November, City Council approved \$35,000 for the project, jointly funded by Public Works and Parks & Recreation. Easements were provided by Columbia Public Schools at no cost. The project was bid and awarded to Tom Adair Construction.

"This was truly a community project where multiple governmental agencies worked together for the common good of the students at Delmar Cobble School, as well as the community," said Assistant Public Works Director David Nichols.

### Home sprinklers

Nationwide, more than 4,000 people die in fires each year. Fire sprinklers save lives, reduce property loss and can even help cut homeowner insurance premiums.

Installing both smoke alarms and a fire sprinkler system reduces the risk of death in a home fire by 82 percent, relative to having neither. Ninety percent of fires are contained by the operation of just one sprinkler, which uses a fraction of the water used by fire department hoses.

Nationally, on average, home fire sprinkler systems cost \$1.61 per square foot of "sprinklered" space in new construction. Home fire sprinklers are as reliable as home plumbing systems, are inconspicuous and can be mounted flush with walls or ceilings.

### Tree Power


Fall is a great time to plant a tree and save energy.

### Volunteers of the Month

When Matt Mazick, a senior journalism student, and Carly Love, a graduate student in occupational therapy, were approached by the City to lead the monthly Columbia Crawdad Missouri Stream Team Cleanup, they were pleasantly surprised because they already knew each other from working together

as Mizzou residential aides.

For the past year, Mazick and Love have led volunteers picking up trash along streams that dump into Hinkson Creek. They also lead a short educational period about the importance of stream clean. It usually takes less than three hours for the 10-15 volunteers to clean the area where they collect 20-40 bags of trash.


"It brings me joy to clean up nature and see parts of Columbia I don't usually see," Love said.

To motivate people in keeping the streams clean, Mazick would like to show them the aftermath of a football game — all the trash found after cleaning or before and after photos. Last year, the group filled 60 trash bags cleaning the Flat Branch area after a game.

Mazick and Love took their volunteer spirit overseas this summer. Love volunteered with college students in Nagoya, Japan, for eight weeks, and Mazick volunteered four weeks in South Korea, where he taught English.
