

Winter energy efficiency tips

To keep your home energy efficient this winter, City of Columbia Utilities suggests following these helpful tips:

- Have 18 inches of proper attic insulation to save money on heating.
- Set your thermostat settings at 68 degrees, or as low as possible, when you're home.
- Set your thermostat settings at 60 degrees when you're not home.
- Replace the weatherstripping on exterior doors.
- Install new door sweeps or bottom seals.
- Caulk window and door frames on the exterior of your home.
- Close the fireplace damper when not in use.
- Wear layers of clothing and use extra blankets in the winter.
- For windows that receive direct sunlight, keep shades open during the day and close them at night.


African American History Exhibit

Utility bill payment agreement options

Utility Customer Service (UCS) encourages you to start the New Year off right by learning about payment agreements. Customers who need a few extra days to pay a bill may request a payment extension by calling 573.874.7380 or coming into the office at 701 E. Broadway.

Payment agreements must be paid in full by 5 p.m. on the agreed upon date. As long as the terms of the agreement are met, there is no limit on how many agreements you may make. However, it's important to note that if an agreement is broken (paid late or paid short), UCS would not be able to offer another one for 12 months.

Payment agreements for one past-due bill may be done over the phone, but if the past-due amount represents more than one bill, you must do the agreement in person. You do not need to wait until a bill is past due to request an extension. We encourage you to call us to discuss the possibility of a payment agreement if it's something that you need.

Don't become a victim while warming up your vehicle

Having your vehicle stolen is not a good way to start 2019. In order to have a nice, warm seat when you leave for work, school or errands means a lot of people will start their vehicle and go back inside while it warms up. This is like putting a big neon sign above your running vehicle, saying "TAKE ME, TAKE ME!!"

The Columbia Police Department would like to offer some helpful tips to warm up your vehicle:

- Park your vehicle in the garage if you have one.
- Stand with your vehicle while it is warming up.
- If you are able, have plenty of light surrounding your vehicle.
- Try using a window ice shield, which can be found at many automotive retailers, to reduce the time it takes to melt ice from your windshield.

If you do have to start your vehicle and go inside, use a second set of keys so you can lock your door while you aren't with it. Also, there are many devices at various different prices that can either immobilize or even track a stolen vehicle using GPS technology.

Just remember, motor vehicle theft is a crime of opportunity. The lower the opportunity that you give thieves to steal your vehicle, the less of a chance you become a victim.

Progress as Promised: Speed bumps installed on Sexton Road



The City of Columbia Public Works Department installed speed bumps on Sexton Road between Business Loop 70 and Providence Road as a traffic calming solution.

The City of Columbia Public Works Department installed speed bumps on Sexton Road between Business Loop 70 and Providence Road in 2018. Sexton Road was No. 1 on the 2017 Neighborhood Traffic Management Program Priority List.

The Public Works Traffic Engineering Division provides traffic calming solutions designed to influence driver behavior and create more livable neighborhood streets by slowing down traffic. Engineers conduct appropriate studies to quantify any problems, work closely with neighborhood residents to identify their concerns and develop strategies to moderate traffic speeds.

The ultimate goal is to reduce the number and severity of collisions. While there are budgetary and public input considerations, it is the goal of Public Works to find ways to address as many issues as feasible each year.

The estimated project investment was \$75,000 paid for through Annual Traffic Calming Funds. Engineers hosted two interested parties meetings to gather public input on Nov. 30, 2017 and March 15, 2018. City Council approved the calming project after a public hearing on Aug. 6, 2018.

Space heater safety tips

Space heaters are a popular way to add supplemental heat to a room or space, but they are also very dangerous when not used properly. If you use a space heater, please view the following safety tips from the Columbia Fire Department:

- Keep all combustible material at least 3 feet away from space heaters.
- Never use space heaters as a primary heat source.
- Place your heater on a solid, flat surface.
- Make sure your heater has an auto shut-off to turn the heater off if it tips over.
- Space heaters should be turned off and unplugged when you leave the room or go to bed.

Code Corner: Occupancy restrictions

Occupancy limitations help protect the quality of life in Columbia's neighborhoods. Too many occupants can lead to increased traffic, trash, and noise and may create an unsafe living condition for the occupants. Under the definition of family in Chapter 29 of City code, no more than three unrelated people can live together in R-1 zoning districts and some planned developments and no more than four unrelated people can live together in other zoning districts. Over occupancy is a violation of the City's zoning code. To learn about or report an occupancy issue or other residential code violation, contact Neighborhood Services at 573.817.5050.

Steve Matthews has been volunteering with the City of Columbia Volunteer Programs since 2002. Steve has been heavily involved with the Treekeepers and CARP programs; dedicating nearly 1,000 hours over the last 16 years to removing overgrown honeysuckle and falling trees in and around Columbia's many parks and trails.

Steve's love of trees is deeply rooted in the way in which he was raised.

"I was raised on a large farm along the Missouri River, and we were taught that a 'weed' is a plant you don't want to grow on your land," Steve said.

When "greedy growth" such as bush honeysuckle threatens to kill native trees and plants, Steve takes pride in rescuing them from extinction. Just this year, Steve cut very overgrown honeysuckle around Grindstone Park. Steve states the patrons of the park "were super appreciative of my efforts to open up the jungle, which is something that really keeps me going."

When Steve isn't cutting honeysuckle you can often find him reading books from the local library.

"I was born in the bookmobile of rural Ray County, I sometimes think!" Steve joked.

2013 sewer bond update

City Council called a special election on Nov. 5, 2013 where voters approved sewer system revenue bonds in the amount of \$32,340,000. Approximately 73 percent of these funds were allocated for improvements to the existing sewer collection system. This includes repairing current sewer infrastructure to address structural deficiencies and reduce inflow and infiltration of stormwater into the sewer system, which can cause backups or overflows during heavy rains.

Sewer revenue bonds are also being used to replace failing private common collectors with a public sewer collection system that meets Columbia's sewer standards. The remaining 17 percent of 2013 bond funds were to be allocated for system expansion and necessary upgrades to the City's Wastewater Treatment Plant (WWTP). Improvements to the digester complex at the WWTP were approved by Council in November and construction is anticipated to begin mid-2019.
