

City of Columbia's Fourth of July Fire in the Sky

Celebrate the Fourth of July at the City of Columbia's 65th annual Fire in the Sky event. Free activities and entertainment will begin at 6:30 p.m. at Flat Branch Park, 101 S. Fourth St., and Peace Park, 401 S. Ninth St.

Two stages of entertainment feature the Fried Crawdaddies, Norm Ruebling Band, Alec Davis Band and Murphy's Ford. Kids will enjoy themed crafts and inflatables. Fireworks will begin at 9:15 p.m. and will be launched from the top of the parking garage at Sixth and Cherry. They will be choreographed to music simulcast on KBXR 102.3.

Food trucks will be available at both locations and parking will be free downtown and on the University of Missouri campus. Attendees should bring a blanket or lawn chairs; alcohol and fireworks are not allowed.

Fire in the Sky is presented by Columbia Insurance Group and KOMU 8. The event is sponsored by KBXR 102.3, KFRU 1400, City of Columbia Convention and Visi-

Summer fire safety

The Columbia Fire Department hopes you enjoy this summer, but also remember that this time of the year presents opportunities for fires and injuries. Following are tips to help make your summer safe:

- Don't wear loose clothing while cooking at a BBQ.
- Be careful when using lighter fluid: Do not add fluid to an already lit fire. The flame can flashback into the container and explode.
- Keep all matches and lighters away from children.
- Inspect the area around a barbecue or campfire. Grills or campfires should not be lit near other flammable materials including dry grass or over-hanging branches.
- Dispose of hot coals properly—douse them with plenty of water and stir them to ensure the fire is out. Never place them in plastic, paper or wooden containers.
- Allow tractors or lawn mowers to cool down outside before being stored in a shed or garage.
- Keep mowers clean of lawn debris. Dried grass near a heated area may cause a fire.
- Install and test smoke alarms in garages and storage areas.
- Keep gas and fuel containers stored in wellventilated outdoor storage areas.

Fireworks prohibited inside city limits

From June 1, 2016 until July 31, 2016, the Columbia Police Department (CPD) responded to approximately 232 calls for service regarding fireworks. About 110 of those calls occurred on the Fourth of July. As that time of the year is quickly approaching, CPD and the Columbia Fire Department remind citizens that discharging and/or possessing fireworks within City of Columbia limits is prohibited.

Under Section 16-234 (a) in the City of Columbia Ordinances, "every person who shall...possess, use, burn, explode or set off any firecracker, torpedo, bomb, rocket, pinwheel, fire balloon, Roman candles or any other firecracker or fireworks other than a sparkler with the city shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, except as provided in paragraph (b) of [the] section."

CPD will have extra patrol officers on duty at the end of June and beginning of July for fireworks enforcement. Citizens with a fireworks complaint can contact Boone County Joint Communications non-emergency line at 573-442-6131. Do not call 9-1-1 unless it is an emergency.

According to the United States Consumer Product Safety Commission, in 2013, there were eight deaths and an estimated 11,400 consumers who sustained injuries nationwide related to fireworks. This was an increase from 8,700 injuries in 2012. In 2013, sparklers and rockets accounted for more than 40 percent of all estimated injuries.

Public safety officials encourage citizens to leave the fireworks to the professionals this Fourth of July and attend the **FREE** Fire in the Sky event in downtown Columbia.

Street Talk: Take the experimental bike pavement markings survey



Columbia Public Works, in partnership with the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA), is conducting an online survey about experimental bike markings located at four Columbia intersections. The experimental bike markings are currently located on the northbound and southbound approaches of Garth and Broadway, Garth and

Worley, West Boulevard and Worley, and West Boulevard and Broadway.

"Feedback from the survey will be provided to FHWA and, if successful, could be implemented nationwide," Traffic Engineer Lee White said. "The purpose of the markings is to make biking in Columbia simpler and more convenient."

The pavement markings were previously tested in a bicycle simulator at the University of Missouri-Columbia's ZouSim testing lab in 2015. The survey will close on July 5. The survey is available on the Public Works website at **CoMo.gov/publicworks/biking**.

Columbia Parks and Recreation recently completed improvements to Nifong Park located at 3700 Ponderosa St.

Park improvements include a new farm-themed playground, replacement of the shelter near the playground, construction of a fishing dock and a new small shelter, two new parking lots, walkways, signage and lighting.

Funding for Nifong Park improvements came from the voter-approved Park Sales Tax and a \$125,000 donation from the Columbia Cosmopolitan Luncheon Club.

Volunteer of the Month—Jane Phillips

In late winter 2016 Jane Phillips, an East Campus resident and member of the East Campus Neighborhood Association (ECNA), initiated an invasive plant removal project.

She began a series of emails to East Campus residents about invasive plant species, especially bush honeysuckle. She pointed out the drawbacks of many non-native plants and extolled the virtues of native Missouri plants for yards and parks.

There are several volunteer groups that work to control invasive plants on public land only to have those parks and trails re-infested by the adjoining neighborhood. Invasive plant control on private land was an unmet need. She communicated with staff from Columbia Parks and Recreation and from the Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC).

Phillips collaborated with MDC on a grant proposal for a professional contractor to remove invasive plants in the less accessible steep and rocky forests on private land in the neighborhood. ECNA is partnering with MDC by using volunteer teams on easier areas and by soliciting matching funds. ECNA has donated \$1,000 for the first year and \$400 per year for three years to be used for materials and equipment.

MDC is looking at ECNA's invasive plant removal project as a pilot project that could be used as a model for other urban neighborhoods in Columbia and across the state.

Updating utility information

It's not often that Utility Customer Services (UCS) would need to contact customers directly, but when the need arises (power outages, boil-water orders or courtesy-call reminders of past due bills), it is important to have a valid phone number on record. UCS would also like to remind customers who may be leaving for the summer to provide a temporary mailing address.

Customers may also register online at CoMo.gov. Online access means customers will always know the status of their account, and can pay bills online as well. Customers may update contact information by filling out the back of the bill they enclose with payment, calling the UCS office at 573-874-7380, or going online to the utility customer service page [CoMo.gov/ Utilities/ucs] and selecting the "Update your Contact Information" link under Other Utility Information.

Code Corner – Vacant properties

A vacant house that is maintained is not a violation of City code, however, if the property is not secured, is not maintained and the yard is not being mowed, the house can become a problem. The Office of Neighborhood Services may be able to assist if a vacant property has code violations.

If a house is in severe disrepair it may qualify as a nuisance property. Nuisance properties are those that pose a safety issue for the community and when necessary the City will demolish them.
