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# **Operations Report**

Significant Events from Operational Period:

- Staff met with street outreach team to work with individuals who were unsheltered that were placed into isolation/quarantine recently.
- Provided testing to individuals who were in quarantine that don't have access to transportation.
- Provided information regarding sanitizer and EPA approved solutions to REDI.
- Provided response regarding installation of specialized HVAC systems to an establishment that sought recommendations.
- Information and Guidance met to make determination regarding how restaurants should handle requests for reservations of groups of more than 10 and determined they should be handled as they would in a hotel, and apply the business guidance to them as such.
- Made contact with individual businesses who are requiring additional guidance and assistance with identifying contacts that may have been exposed at their place of business.
- Extended room reservations for individuals who didn't have the means to meet the need on their own in isolation and quarantine to meet their release date.
- Organized national guard to pick up PPE for today's testing event.
- Various staff members assisted in arranging food through Meals on Wheels for individuals in isolation/quarantine that are unable to meet the need on their own.
- Provided monthly expenditures for PHHS supported isolation and quarantine lodging.
- Recorded volunteer hours produced from Epidemiology/Disease Containment unit.
- PHHS Director extended Public Health order, now to expire on November 17 2020.

As ESF-6 lead, City of Columbia Division of Human Services has organized five local funders (City, County, United Way, Community Foundation, and VU Foundation) in a collaborative called ComoHelps (<u>http://comohelps.org</u>). Through this collaborative we have consolidated financial donations for the COVID-19 response. Financial contributions are being routed to the Heart of Missouri United Way and the Community Foundation of Central Missouri. Nonprofit and governmental volunteer needs are posted, along with the opportunity for community members to sign up as unaffiliated volunteers for assignment as needed.

ComoHelps also developed a single, joint application for nonprofits to submit requests for funding. This expedites access to support for nonprofits and allows us to coordinate funding

used in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. The ComoHelps collaborative meets daily to review and prioritize requests and to allocate funding. The current focus is on funding services being provided in response to COVID-19. Requests for nonprofit sustainability are being referred to federal CARES Act programs and tabled for later consideration. Because this funding collaborative is so unique, ComoHelps have received grants from state and national foundations.

The University of Missouri hosts a walk up clinic for COVID 19 testing to its MU Students beginning 8/24/2020.

MU Healthcare hosts a drive thru COVID 19 testing site located at 115 Business Loop 70 W. The site hours of operation to Mon-Fri 8 AM to 7 PM, Saturday 8 AM to Noon, and closed on Sundays.

Boone Hospital hosts a drive thru COVID 19 testing site. This site's hours of operation are Mon-Fri 8 AM-4:30 PM, and Saturdays 8 AM to Noon, closed on Sundays.
