



Molly Thomas Bowden Neighborhood Policing Center nears completion



The City of Columbia's first neighborhood policing center, named in honor of fallen officer Molly Thomas Bowden, is near completion. The center is located at 1204 International Drive and will serve as a multifaceted hub for community members and officers. A ribbon cutting will be held this spring to commemorate the opening of the facility.

Once operational later this year, the Molly Thomas Bowden Neighborhood Policing Center will consist of a 24,539 square foot space, which includes offices, a lobby, reception area, community meeting room, department meeting room, specialized storage, locker rooms and a fitness center. The center will ultimately serve as a symbol for those who protect and serve us every day and officers like Molly, who gave the ultimate sacrifice to protect her community.

Professional Contractors and Engineers, a local construction company, began the construction of the policing center in March 2020. The new police facility was approved by voters in 2015 as a capital improvement project. The total project cost is \$9.69 million and is funded through the 2015 Capital Improvement Sales Tax. The total cost for building construction was \$7.6 million.

Additionally, community members will enjoy a piece of public art, created by Missouri artist Beth Nybeck that will be installed near the entrance. This component of the building is sponsored by the City's Percent for Art program, which is hosted through the Office of Cultural Affairs.

Parks and Recreation completes tennis court improvements at Cosmo Park





Tennis players at Cosmo Park will be able to enjoy newly renovated courts this spring. Columbia Parks and Recreation completed improvements at the courts, located at 1615 Business Loop 70 W.

Four of the courts on the north side of the tennis complex underwent a facelift, including asphalt crack repair, painting and installation of lines.

The total cost of the improvements was \$54,000. Funding in the amount of \$40,000 came from the voter-approved 2015 Park Sales Tax and the remainder came from a United States Tennis Association (USTA) grant.

McBaine Water Treatment Plant improvements

Columbia Water & Light is planning improvements on the McBaine Water Treatment Plant. Engineering and design will be ongoing throughout 2021, with a construction contract expected to be awarded in early 2022.

In August 2018, Columbia voters approved Proposition 1, which funds capital improvements for the water system. Proposition 1 authorized the City to bond nearly \$43 million for water distribution improvements. Of that amount, approximately \$23 million is dedicated to the McBaine Water Treatment Plant project.

The McBaine Water Treatment Plant was built in 1970, with upgrades and expansions in 1994 and 2007. The McBaine Water Treatment Plant has a rated capacity of 32 million gallons per day, but because of aging equipment, the facility can only reliably treat 24 million gallons per day.

The City's 2015 Long Range Water System Study also found there is insufficient treatment capacity at the Plant to meet anticipated demands within the study planning horizon (2033).

This improvement project will restore treatment capacity to meet current and anticipated demands.

Since the 1970s, the City's groundwater supply and the McBaine Water Treatment Plant have provided drinking water that meets all federal Safe Drinking Water Act requirements (www.epa.gov/sdwa). Columbia's water is tested more frequently and thoroughly than required by law.

The well water is monitored for the possibility of contamination and many recommendations from the 2013 Source Water Protection Plan have been implemented. More than 4,000 tests are run each year on samples at the McBaine WTP, and from more than 30 locations throughout the City's water system.

Code Corner - tall grass

The City of Columbia vegetation management ordinance addresses turf and turf weeds that are 12 inches or taller. This ordinance is in place to deter rodent harborage and also protects property values for neighborhoods in the cases where lawns are not maintained. When properties are out of compliance, the City may cut the weeds and tax bill the property for mowing. In 2020, Neighborhood Services handled more than 800 vegetation cases.

Street Talk: All About Potholes



The goal of Public Works is to patch potholes as soon as possible to prevent nearby pavement from deteriorating further.

Potholes can occur at any time during the year, but they tend to appear more frequently after winter weather as temperatures fluctuate. Potholes form when water seeps into the pavement. The moisture expands in freezing temperatures, pushing the pavement upward. When the ice melts it leaves behind a pocket in the road. When cars drive over these areas, they crush and loosen the pavement, creating potholes.

The City of Columbia Street Division uses an asphalt recycler to make a hot mix for repairing potholes on City streets, even on cold days. A hotbox trailer is then

used to transport the hot mix to the street while keeping it at 350 degrees. Cold mix patching is still used as needed because the preparation process is shorter.

We endeavor to keep as many streets as possible in good shape to minimize potholes developing. We encourage individuals to report any pothole issues by calling 573.874.CITY (2489), by emailing PubW@CoMo.gov or by completing an online reporting form at: CoMo.gov/CMS/WebForms/form.php?formid=165.

Springtime often means getting ready to move. Don't forget your utility account! If you're leaving for the summer, please remember to cancel your services. You can do this in person, online at CoMo.gov, or by calling Utility Customer Services (UCS) at 573.874.7380. Customers who leave temporarily for the summer, or who are required to keep utilities active until their leases expire, may provide UCS with a temporary alternate mailing address. This will ensure that you receive your bills in a timely manner, allowing you to keep your utility account current. You may also do this by phone or online by selecting the "update your contact information" link. You may also keep track of the status of your account by registering for the MyUtilityBill customer portal at myutilitybill.como.gov/register. If you have additional questions as your move approaches, contact UCS at 573.874.7380.
