Water & Light offers incentives for EV charger installation

City of Columbia Water & Light has taken an important step to encourage electric vehicle adoption in Columbia. Water & Light has launched a pilot rebate program to help offset some of the cost for customers who would like to install electric vehicle chargers at their residences.

Through the Utility's Electric Vehicle Charger Rebate Program, residential customers can receive up to \$500 for installing a Level 2 charging station in an existing home or new residential construction or up to \$100 for the installation of 240-volt NEMA outlets in new construction houses to make the new home EV ready. Approval from the property owner is required, if applicable.

Upgrades that can be covered by the rebate include labor, building material and charging equipment. Level 2 charging is the industry standard for in-home charging stations. These Level 2 chargers will allow a customer to fully charge a vehicle in four to eight hours.



Level 2 chargers are sold separately from the car, although they're often purchased at the same time. These chargers require a slightly more complicated setup, as they are plugged into a 240-volt outlet which allows charging three to seven times faster depending on the electric car and the charger.

East Walnut Street improvements taking shape



Be extra mindful when you're traveling on East Walnut Street east of College Avenue over the next few months. From now through July, contractors for Public Works will be resurfacing the roadway and repairing curbs, gutters, sidewalks and driveway approaches on East Walnut Street between College Avenue and Old Highway 63.

In addition to resurfacing East Walnut Street across the 2,700-foot work zone, installation has also started on replacing 2,280 square feet of sidewalk, which includes new curb ramps and landings to meet ADA requirements. A total of 1,550 feet of curbs and gutters will also be rebuilt, providing the area with an overall improved look. Finally, new pavement markings will be painted, including new crosswalks, making East Walnut Street more safe for people walking and people biking.

Intermittent lane restrictions and road closures will be necessary as the project continues through July, weather permitting. Periodic updates on the project will continue to be available on Public Works social media pages from now until completion.

This project was made possible by Columbia residents who voted for the 2015 Transportation Sales Tax Ballot Initiative. Through the public process at that time, the City heard that taking care of existing facilities was an important aspect citizens wanted the City to focus on. Based on that feedback, projects to repair portions of Rangeline Street, Garth Avenue and this project along East Walnut Street were included, along with other major reconstruction and new project efforts. We appreciate the support of citizens on these critical infrastructure needs and look

Severe weather safety for spring

In the event of a disaster, specific information would be obtained from local broadcast media. Everyone (e.g., schools, businesses, families) should have basic knowledge of severe weather safety and a plan in place. Knowing what to do or where to go when severe weather threatens can mean the difference between life and death. It is a good time for all residents to practice their severe weather safety plans. Prepare now for a sudden emergency.

Some steps to take are:

- Create an emergency plan and discuss it with family members.
- Prepare a disaster supplies kit. Assemble drinking water, food and supplies (battery-powered radio, flashlights, etc.).
- Locate hazards in your home. In an emergency, ordinary items in the home can cause injury and damage. Anything that can move, fall, break or cause a fire is a potential hazard.
- Know what to do and where to go if you have to evacuate.
- Prepare an emergency car kit and a fire safety plan.


