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Columbia Police Department welcomes six new officers

Please join us in welcoming six new officers to the Columbia Police Department! To reach graduation, officers completed more than 700 hours of academy training over the course of 16 weeks. Their education began in May and covered topics including legal studies, practical skills training, interpersonal and cultural competencies, physical fitness and more.

Now that they've been sworn in, the officers will transition to the Department's field training program for approximately 16 weeks. During this time the new officers will be paired with experienced field training officers who will provide guidance and oversee their progress on all aspects of Columbia policing, including law enforcement and community relations.

Improving Livability: Public Works highlights for 2023

Throughout 2023, the City of Columbia Public Works department continued work to enhance City infrastructure and improve quality of life for our residents. Thanks to funding received from sources such as the 2015 Capital Improvement Sales Tax ballot initiative supported by residents, Public Works continues to make strides toward improving safety, accessibility and livability for everyone who calls Columbia home. Here are some of the key projects Public Works completed in 2023:

The East Walnut Street improvement project provided resurfacing along with extensive repairs to curbs, gutters,

sidewalks and driveway approaches along East Walnut Street. The project prioritized accessibility, including ADA-compliant sidewalk ramps and landings, ensuring a safer environment for people walking and biking.

Sidewalk construction projects on Oakland Gravel Road and North Stadium Boulevard filled in missing sections of sidewalk and added new pedestrian islands, crosswalk markings and accessible pedestrian signals. The projects improved connectivity and enhanced Columbia's walkability.

Worley Street Accessible Pedestrian Signals - New traffic signal equipment was installed on two of West Worley Street's busiest intersections. These include accessible pedestrian signals with countdown timers and audible crossing cues, making crossing the street safer for our most vulnerable travelers.

Renovations to Eighth and Cherry Parking Garage included waterproofing of the garage's driving lanes and interior restriping. Bright new indoor LED lighting also provides enhanced visibility and security.

The Maguire Slope stabilization project focused on rebuilding sidewalks and reshaping the rock slopes to prevent debris from falling onto Maguire Boulevard.

Public Works also invested in substantial pavement maintenance to approximately 170 different city streets to ensure that Columbia's road network remains safe and reliable for residents and commuters. Traffic calming measures such as speed humps were added to eight new residential streets to reduce speeds and create more liveable, pedestrian-friendly neighborhoods. Approximately 150 ADA ramps were also built or rebuilt to current ADA standards in 2023.

Code Corner: Residential code cases in FY 2023

Neighborhood Services handled 5,315 residential code issues in the City's 2023 fiscal year ending Sept. 30. Solid Waste cases made up the largest number with 2,105 followed by landscape management at 993 and health nuisance cases at 894. Resident complaints accounted for about 30% of the cases with the remainder proactively identified by staff.

Rental housing compliance, part of Neighborhood Services, ended the year with 27,689 units and 9,745 buildings in compliance. In 2023, staff responded to 258 tenant complaints.

The 12th Operation Clean Neighborhoods, a City employee work day, was held Sept. 22 at Worley Street Park and the surrounding neighborhood. Over 70 City of Columbia staff participated in the event alongside residents.

Work included removing vegetation from the park boundary as well as cleaning streets and sidewalks. Street markings were refreshed, litter was picked up in the neighborhood and more than 40 waste tires were disposed of from residents. Dumpsters were provided in the Ridgeway and West Ash Neighborhoods for resident use.

City staff enjoy participating in Operation Clean Neighborhoods as a way to serve our residents, meet one another and make a visible difference in our neighborhoods.

Does your attic insulation measure up?



Proper insulation will help with the retention of both warm air and cool air, lowering energy costs for heating and cooling.

As autumn settles in and cooler weather approaches, it is a good time to start thinking about what can be done to make your home more comfortable in winter and what will help save energy and money. One of the biggest areas to consider at this time is the insulation in your attic. If you find you need to add insulation, City of Columbia Water & Light's award-winning Home
Performance program offers rebates and loans that can help finance your project.

The Home Performance program is available to Water & Light customers in single-family homes and larger duplexes and condos. Through this program, residents could be eligible for up to \$500 in rebates for adding insulation and up to \$1,200 in total for energy efficiency upgrades.

Adding attic insulation is an investment that will pay for itself in two to five years. Low levels of insulation is one of the biggest sources of energy waste and discomfort. If your attic insulation level is near the top of the attic floor joists, you have only about half the insulation you should.

How do you know if you have enough insulation? Either read the R-value printed on the batts of your existing insulation or use a measuring tape or ruler to measure the depth of the insulation. Columbia Water & Light recommends having 16 to 18 inches of attic insulation (R-50). If you need help finding information about your home, we can help during a Free Energy Assessment, offered at no cost to all Columbia Water & Light customers.

To maximize the efficiency of your energy improvements, Home Performance rebates and loans require the below insulation levels in key areas:

- Attic: R-50
- Floor over unconditioned space: R-19
- Crawlspace walls OR floors above crawlspace: R-10 with a vapor barrier covering the ground
- Ducts: R-13 in unheated areas
- Rim-joists: R-13

Residential electric customers who are not eligible for the Home Performance program may be eligible for rebates through Water & Light's Attic Plus program. For more information on insulation and all of our efficiency programs, visit **ColumbiaPowerPartners.com** or call 573.441.5528.
