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How to prevent 'porch pirates' from stealing packages



Porch pirates likely hope that small packages contain expensive items that can be resold, such as phones, video game systems, sound systems or computers.

It's the giving season and time to protect your incoming packages from theft. Columbia Police officers are on alert for suspicious activity, but there are steps you can take to assure the gifts you buy reach those you care for.

Video doorbells are becoming cheaper and more easily available. Someone thinking of stealing your package might see the video doorbell and think again. Video footage also helps our detectives and officers identify suspects if the camera doesn't deter theft.

Advertise if your home is protected by cameras or a home security system. According to data from the University of North Carolina, 83% of burglars try to determine if a house has a system. If protected, 87% of burglars would move on to another home.

Use package tracking so you are aware when packages arrive and can quickly retrieve them once delivered. You can also opt to require a signature on delivery to prevent packages from sitting around and becoming targets for theft.

You can't always control when packages are delivered, but you can choose where. Opt to pick up your package directly from your shipping service instead. Amazon also has lockers throughout the city where a package can be securely delivered for retrieval at your convenience.

With package theft becoming more frequent during the holidays and throughout the year, a porch lock box could be a permanent solution. When you order online you can tell the delivery driver how to access the box.

We're thankful for any measures you can take to help keep our community a safer place for everyone. If you are a victim of any kind of theft, call 311 to file a non-emergency police report. In an emergency, always call 911.

Schlude has served as the assistant police chief in Columbia since 2019.


Before being assistant police chief, she worked as the deputy chief of police, a police sergeant, and a police officer in the same department. She has been with the Columbia Police Department since 2005.

The City of Columbia is now gathering feedback for its FY 2025 through FY 2029 Consolidated Plan. The City of Columbia's five-year Consolidated Plan is a document required by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

The current Consolidated Plan is approved from FY 2019 through FY 2024.

The FY 2025 - FY 2029 plan is currently being developed and will be due to HUD in November 2024. The plan is designed to help guide the community in directing federal dollars received in the areas of affordable housing, economic development, fair housing, community facilities and neighborhood needs.

The consolidated planning process serves as an avenue for the public to weigh in on the most important community needs in Columbia.

Shelters provide sleeping accommodations and may or may not include meals. Shelter availability may vary. Specific questions about the shelters should be directed to the applicable provider.

OVERNIGHT WARMING CENTER

The City of Columbia contracts with Turning Point to provide temporary overnight warming center services at Wilkes Boulevard United Methodist Church, 702 Wilkes Blvd. The temporary overnight warming center at this location will open only in the event of a National Weather Service forecast of temperatures 25 degrees Fahrenheit or below between the hours of 7 p.m. and 7 a.m. of a given night.

The temporary overnight warming center will serve as a refuge of last resort for persons unwilling or unable to access local emergency shelter services. Turning Point staff will continue to coordinate closely with homeless service providers to ensure low barrier access to overnight emergency shelter as the preferred option for persons experiencing unsheltered homelessness.

WARMING CENTERS

Columbia/Boone County Public Health and Human Services also coordinates a network of warming centers in the community. As the temperature begins to drop, the public is reminded of several locations in Columbia available to those who need shelter from the cold.

Warming centers are available to the general public during the building's normal business hours. The public is allowed access to public areas, such as lobbies, restrooms, drinking fountains, etc.
