Investing in our City's infrastructure



As fire trucks age beyond the point of reasonable repair, sales tax revenue is allocated towards their replacement.

The City of Columbia is committed to making investments in our future through a variety of strategic and critical infrastructure projects.

For several decades, the quarter-cent Capital Improvement Sales Tax has allowed the City to pursue those projects, ensuring continual upgrades to streets, sidewalks, equipment and safety services.

During the current funding period of 2016-2025, sales tax revenue has made major impacts on the daily lives of residents and visitors alike.

Using funds from the Capital Improvement Sales Tax, roads like Rangeline Street, Nifong Boulevard,

Discovery Parkway and East Walnut Street have seen significant reconstruction. Major street projects like these not only address surface issues, but often reconstruct the road base for long-lasting repairs.

Additionally, funds from the sales tax are used to replace deteriorating curbs and sidewalks, enhancing pedestrian safety and improving accessibility for all members of a diverse community.

Capital Improvement Sales Tax funds have played a major role in replacing aging fire trucks, building new fire stations and improving the facilities where our firefighters train.

Funding from the sales tax has supported the establishment of the Molly Bowden Neighborhood Policing Center, strengthening connections between law enforcement and our local neighborhoods.

For Public Works, the 2016-2025 sales tax will also fund the construction of a new municipal service center, aimed at enhancing response times for snowplow operations during winter weather events.

Projects completed with sales tax funding ensure a brighter future for all our residents.





Water & Light offers rebates that will save you money and water

You can maintain a good-looking yard while keeping your water bills manageable. City of Columbia Water & Light offers an irrigation efficiency rebate program through which our customers can save money while getting the best performance from their irrigation system.

Up to 60% of water use in the summer is used on outdoor landscaping. But, according to the Environmental Protection Agency, up to 50% of outdoor watering is wasted through evaporation, runoff and inefficient practices, such as overwatering.

City of Columbia Water & Light offers rebates on:

Smart irrigation controllers: These devices will automatically adjust your watering schedule based on local weather data and what type of soil, grass and plants you have in your yard to improve water efficiency.

Replacing a standard clock timer with a WaterSense labeled irrigation controller can save an average home nearly 7,600 gallons of water annually.

We offer rebates on smart irrigation controllers up to \$150.

Rain sensors: These devices communicate with your irrigation system regarding the amount of rainfall. If the grass is wet with rainfall, the sensor lets the timer know it can skip the next cycle. We offer rebates on rain sensors up to \$150.

High-efficiency sprinkler heads: These sprinkler heads evenly distribute water throughout the irrigated area, resulting in 30% less water use compared to traditional sprayers. We offer a rebate up to \$5 per sprinkler head with a minimum of six.

Every year in May, the U.S. Travel Association holds National Travel and Tourism Week (NTTW). This week is an annual celebration that underscores travel's essential role in driving the nation's economy, cultivating vibrant communities and forging connections. This year's NTTW takes place May 19-25.

Here in Columbia and Boone County, the Missouri Division of Tourism reported \$545 million in tourism-related spending in fiscal year 2023.

As part of this week, the Columbia Convention and Visitors Bureau (CVB) encourages Columbia residents to become a Columbia Tourism Ambassador (CTA), a program that increases your knowledge of the region and prepares you to answer a variety of questions you may receive from visitors.

CTA classes are currently scheduled for Wednesday, June 12 and Thursday, August 20 from 12:30-4:30 p.m. at the CVB, located at 300 S. Providence Road.

The Office of Sustainability is committed to increasing food security and access to fresh, healthy and local foods throughout the community.

City of Columbia's COMO Common Ground Community Gardens (five total) serve over 80 local families. Health, safety and well-being include addressing the impacts of climate change, such as heat stress, air quality and allergens, food security, vector-borne disease and mental health.

Parking enforcement hours changed to 8 a.m. to 6 p.m.

Based on amendments to the City code of ordinances approved by City Council Feb. 5, City of Columbia Parking Utility crews have changed enforcement times at all on-street metered parking spaces to 8 a.m. to 6 p.m.

These changes are being made to align on-street parking enforcement times with those found inside the City's six downtown parking garages. All on-street parking meters and pay-by-app parking signs have been updated with the new hours of enforcement. Drivers should keep in mind that the days of the week that parking is enforced are not being altered.

Christian Sasse-May featured volunteer



Christian Sasse is May's Volunteer of the Month. Christian has been a volunteer with the City of Columbia since 2021.

In May, we are shining our Volunteer Spotlight on Christian Sasse, a GIS analyst who has been a volunteer with the City of Columbia since 2021. Christian started volunteering almost immediately after moving to Columbia, looking for ways to socialize while under restrictions from the COVID-19 pandemic.

"I've been attempting to bring together the places I volunteer with and where I visit for leisure by planning collaborations in hopes of reaching more members of the community and getting a wider demographic of people involved to try and better where we live," Christian said.

When Christian's not volunteering, you can find him at different events hosted throughout the community, such as trivia nights at Hexagon Alley and The Dandy Lion Cafe or at shows put on by Nclusion+ or The Blue Note. When he's relaxing at home, it's usually with his woodworking or a good book.

While Christian focuses most of his volunteering attention on litter pickup and Adopt-a-Trail invasive species removal, he's also an executive committee member for the Missouri chapter of the Sierra Club and supports the Great Rivers Environmental Law Center.

"I think the biggest thing I've gained from volunteering is a better connection with the community and understanding of how many people are trying to help through their own specializations," Christian said.

Christian is looking most forward to the results of the invasive species removal on the trail section he's adopted with the Sierra Club. The goal of invasive species removal is to prevent harm to the environment from aggressive, non-native species and making room for native species to return to the trails without being outcompeted for resources.

"It seems through talking with so many of the people using the trail while we're doing work that they love what we're doing and they get the enjoyment of seeing native species popping up in areas where we've already cleared," Christian said.
